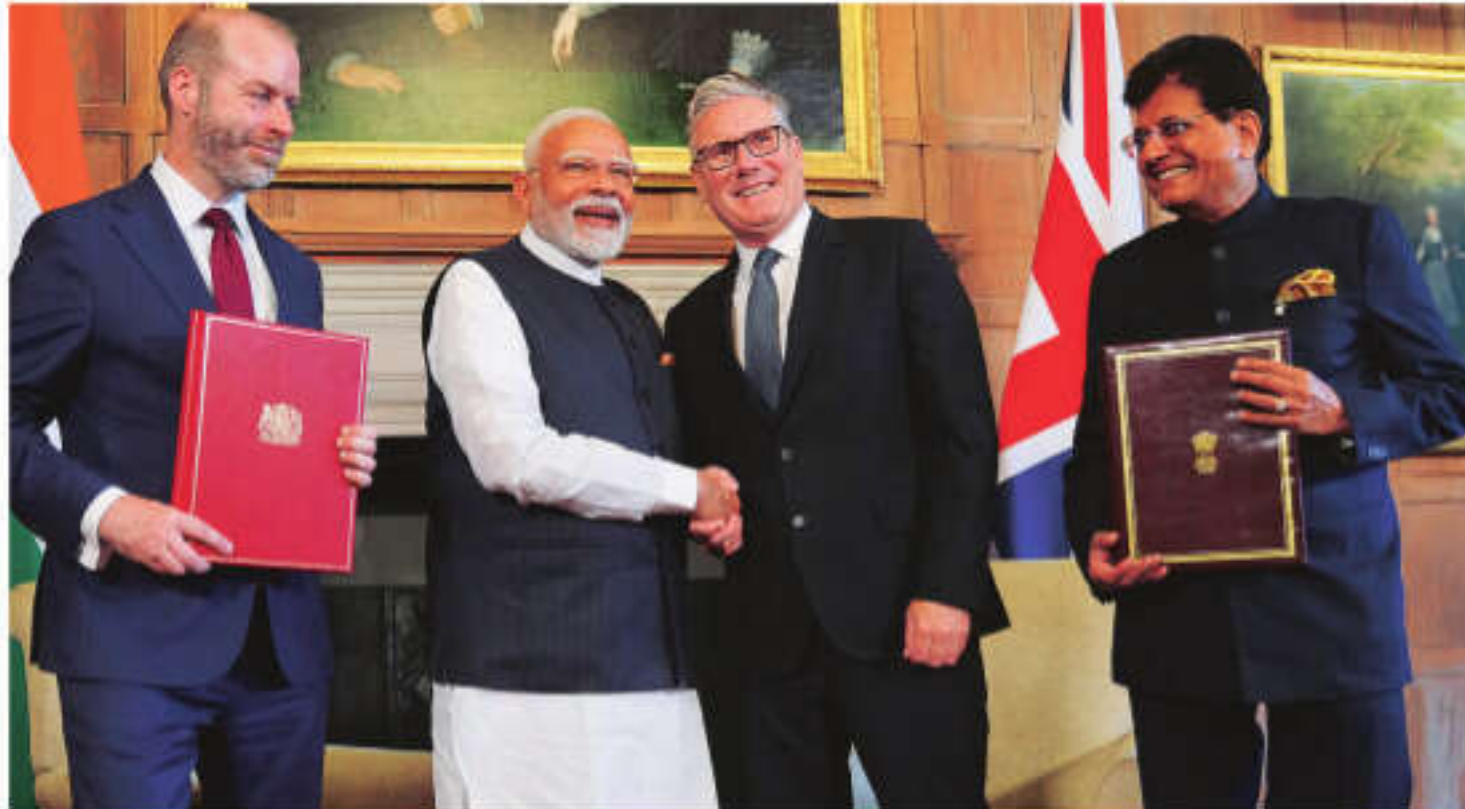

INDIA AND the United Kingdom Thursday signed the much-awaited bilateral free trade agreement in the backdrop of a global trade environment that looks volatile with threats of reciprocal tariffs by the United States of America under President Donald Trump. The Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) promised to usher in "not just an economic partnership but a plan for shared prosperity" for both countries, said Prime

INDIA HAS secured market access for key job-creating sectors such as textiles, footwear, gems and jewellery, and marine products — where the UK is set to eliminate duties of up to 20 per cent. Negotiators have also man-



aged to push for eliminating duties for almost 99.7% of tariff lines in India's food sector. In most food items, the tariffs were as high as 70 per cent. New Delhi extracted enhanced market access in export-oriented sectors such as marine and animal products, including seafood, dairy, and meat products, with

Relief on social security contributions boost for Indian firms, workers

INDIA'S TRADE deal with the UK will provide a boost to domestic services companies, with the two governments agreeing that employees working temporarily for a period of up to three years in the other country will only

have to pay social security contributions in their home countries. This will raise take-home salaries and reduce costs for Indian companies, and is expected to benefit around 75,000 Indian workers.

Data breach at ICAR hits key recruitment, agri research projects

THE INDIAN Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR), the country's apex research organisation in the sector, suffered a security breach earlier this year that led to the loss of "crucial data" related to a range of areas, from recruitment to research projects, *The Indian Express* has learnt. Documents reviewed by this newspaper show that ICAR constituted a six-member committee this month to submit

•Data breach at ICAR hits key recruitment, agri research projects

“recommendations” regarding the “non-functionality of the DC (Data Centre) and DRC (Disaster Recovery Centre)”. The panel was also asked to suggest “suitable measures” to ensure data security and “prevent recurrence of such incidents in future”.

The committee, which was directed to submit its report by July 31, is yet to meet, one of its members told this newspaper.

According to sources, the breach occurred in April and affected the ICAR’s website, its server in Delhi and its replication server at the National Academy of Agricultural Research Management (NAARM) in Hyderabad.

“Data related to recruitment, from Technical Officers to Deputy Directors General (DDG) and job applications sought last year, is missing. The missing data also covers a large number of projects and related information submitted by scientists online and preserved in repositories. It includes email communications,” sources said.

The *Indian Express* spoke to several ICAR scientists, from Lucknow, Karnal, Hyderabad, Pune and Delhi, and all of them said there were “problems on the portal” and that they have raised the issue several times. “It is not only our email communication system that is not working. The problem is that crucial data of recruitment, finances, scientists, research projects and administrative work has vanished from the server and replication server,” said a senior scientist.

When contacted, M L Jat, Secretary, Department of Agricultural Research and Education, and Director General of ICAR, told *The Indian Express*: “A few months back, there was some hacking of our website. Presently, everything is normal. The Ministry has constituted a committee in a follow-up of our

data policy. That is a continuous process.”

A senior member of the Council’s Knowledge Management division said: “Our website icar.org.in was restored in mid-May this year but another website icar.gov.in is still not working.”

The ICAR, which marked its 97th Foundation Day in New Delhi on July 16, describes itself as an organisation that “has been spearheading agricultural research, education and extension activities for productivity enhancement and diversification of Indian agriculture”.

Sources said the affected data was mainly related to Agricultural Scientists Recruitment Board (ASRB), Indian Agricultural Statistics Research Institute (IASRI) and National Academy of Agricultural Research Management (NAARM), all of which function under ICAR.

R C Agrawal, the then DDG of ICAR who was also acting director at NAARM, said, “I am superannuated now. I cannot comment.” IASRI director Rajendra Prasad declined to comment. An official in NAARM said, “We are aware of this data disruption and are facing problems. But I can’t tell you anything else.”

According to sources, the security breach was raised during the Annual General Meeting of the ICAR Society, chaired by Union Agriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan, in Delhi on July 7. Chouhan subsequently directed the formation of the six-member committee to be headed by Dr D K Yadava, DDG (Crop Sciences), ICAR.

Yadava did not respond to requests from *The Indian Express* for comment. A member of the committee said, “We are yet to hold a meeting as we are busy with several things. But we are planning to have one soon.”

India-UK: Deal’s Done

Starmer called it the most important deal after Brexit for the UK. Both the leaders had, on May 6, announced the successful conclusion of negotiations. The joint goal of the two countries is to double the bilateral trade in goods and services by 2030 from \$56 billion now, India’s Commerce and Industry Ministry said.

The signing of the agreement comes weeks after the UK became the first country to finalise a trade deal with the US in early May. India is also aggressively pursuing a deal with the US. Just last week, commerce ministry officials concluded an extended round of talks in Washington D.C., with the next round scheduled for mid-August. India hopes to finalise an interim trade pact with the US by August 1, the date Trump’s reciprocal tariffs will kick in.

Elaborating on what the deal means for India, Modi said, “For the people and industry of India, products made in the UK, such as medical devices and aerospace parts — will be available at accessible and affordable rates. The agreement will prove particularly beneficial for India’s youth, farmers, fishermen, and MSME sector.”

crease bilateral trade between the two countries by nearly 39 per cent in the long run — this is equivalent to \$34.5 billion a year, when compared to 2040 projected levels of trade in the absence of an agreement.

India’s merchandise exports to the UK rose by 12.6 per cent to \$14.5 billion in 2024-25, while imports grew 2.3 per cent to \$8.6 billion. The India-UK deal unlocks tariff-free access on 99 per cent of Indian exports to the UK, covering nearly 100 per cent of trade value— including labour-intensive sectors, the Indian Commerce and Industry Ministry said.

Consumers in India are expected to benefit from improved access to a variety of British products — from soft drinks and cosmetics to cars and medical devices — as average tariffs will drop from 15 per cent to 3 per cent.

Also, 45 per cent of India’s merchandise exports to the UK will not attract any duty, giving a boost to labour-intensive sectors such as textiles and leather, according to New Delhi-based think-tank Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI).

In terms of concessions, India will first halve the duty on Scotch whisky from the UK to 75 per cent and then to 40 per cent over

10 years. In what is seen as a landmark move, duties on automobiles will be cut in a phased manner. As per the deal, India will lower import duties on British cars over 15 years to just 10 per cent from more than 100 per cent for luxury cars. However, the reduced rate of tariff will apply only to 10,000 units, which will rise to 19,000 in the fifth year.

India has excluded several high-sensitivity agricultural products from any tariff concessions. This includes dairy, fresh apples, walnuts, whey and modified whey, blue-veined cheese, and specific seed categories such as vegetable seeds and sugar beet seed. The UK had excluded various meat products and egg-based items, among others, from discussions.

“This CETA marks a milestone in the trade relations between two major economies, setting an ambitious and balanced framework,” Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal said.

Movement of people

Mobility of workers, which had been a bone of contention as India sought improved access for its services sector amid heightened sensitivities in a post-Brexit UK, saw both countries engaging in some give and take. The agree-

ment ensures no caps on the number of UK service providers, although India maintained some regulatory carve-outs, such as in legal services, taxation, and national security. New Delhi-based think-tank Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI) said.

“In contrast, the UK’s services offer to India is more cautious and limited in scope. While it grants commercial presence rights in sectors like computer services, consultancy, and environmental services, its commitments on professional mobility are modest,” GTRI said.

The UK has created an annual quota of 1,800 for temporary entry of traditional chefs, classical musicians, and yoga instructors, although no binding commitment has been made on broader visa categories, including business visitors or IT professionals, GTRI said.

In addition to the trade agreement, a consensus was also reached on the Double Contributions Convention, under which workers from India and the UK temporarily working in the other country for up to three years will only have to make social security contributions in their home countries. “This will inject new energy into the service sectors of both countries, especially in technology and finance. It will promote ease of doing business, reduce the cost of doing business, and increase the confidence of doing business,” Modi said. The UK economy would benefit from India’s skilled talent and enhance investment and generate

new employment opportunities in both countries.

India’s services exports to the UK rose 16 per cent in 2024 to £14.7 billion, according to data from the Office of National Statistics, while services imports from the UK were flat at £10.1 billion.

Vision 2035, defence roadmap

India and the UK Thursday also unveiled a Vision 2035 document to give “new momentum and energy” to the strategic partnership between the two countries over the coming decade, Modi said. The roadmap will form the basis of a “strong, trustworthy, and ambitious partnership” in the fields of technology, defence, climate, education, and people-to-people connectivity, he added.

A defence industrial roadmap has also been drawn up for partnership in defence and security, with work to also continue on strengthening the technology security initiative, with the Indian Prime Minister saying the countries were committed to creating a future together in the fields of artificial intelligence to critical minerals and semiconductors to cybersecurity.

“I would be remiss not to mention cricket when India and the UK are coming together, especially during a Test series. For both of us, cricket is not just a game, but a passion and also a great metaphor for our partnership. There may be a swing, a miss at times, but we always play

with a straight bat. We are committed to building a high-scoring, solid partnership. The agreements concluded today and Vision 2035 are milestones which advance this very spirit.”

United against terrorism

Modi and Starmer also shared views on peace and stability in the Indo-Pacific, the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, and the situation in West Asia.

Thanking Starmer for the British government’s “strong condemnation” of the terrorist attack in Pahalgalam on April 22, Modi said the two countries were united in their view that there was no place for double standards in the fight against terrorism and that extremist ideologies could not be allowed to misuse democratic freedoms. Modi also invited Starmer to India, saying he was looking forward to hosting him “very, very soon”.

Commenting on the trade agreement, UK Business and Trade Secretary Jonathan Reynolds said the deal puts the UK in the best position to partner with India over the next decade and promises to unlock thousands of jobs and boost growth across both economies.

“The nearly £6 billion in new investment and export wins announced today are a sign of things to come, as future collaboration expands into advanced technologies, critical minerals, green finance, and beyond,” he said.

tariffs reduced to zero from up to 20 per cent.

On its part, New Delhi has allowed British companies to participate in a class of public procurement tenders, and also opened the highly-tariffed automobile and alcoholic beverage industries.

The UK government said its large and varied manufacturing sectors will benefit from tariff cuts on aerospace (reduced from as high as 11% to 0%), automobiles (from up to 110% down to 10%), and electrical machinery (from up to 22%).

For the first time, India has allowed duty cuts for UK-origin alcohol including whisky, brandy, rum, vodka, liqueurs, mead, cider, and tequila. These products, which currently face a base customs duty of 150 per cent, will see steep reductions — but only if they meet a Minimum Import Price (MIP) threshold of \$5 per litre or \$6 per 750 ml bottle. For qualifying imports, the duty will be gradually lowered from 110 per cent in Year 1 to 75 per cent by Year 10, through equal annual reductions.

This design helps shield

India’s domestic liquor market from low-cost imports while giving premium UK spirits a competitive edge, New Delhi-based think tank GTRI said.

Significant change of position

In a first, India has allowed UK firms to participate in government tenders, offering them Class Two status under ‘Make in India’ rules, which require 20-50 per cent domestic value addition. While India had previously opened public procurement under the UAE deal, experts said the deal offered to the UK is the most generous yet.

“This is the most extensive concession in government procurement that India has offered in any FTA to date and marks a strategic shift away from using public procurement as a tool for domestic industrial development. The 20 per cent local content rule allows UK firms to use up to 80 per cent inputs from third countries — such as China or the EU — while still receiving preferential treatment, effectively diluting the benefits that programmes like Make in India and Atmanirbhar Bharat were designed to protect,” GTRI said.

The access granted to the UK could also set a precedent for future FTAs with larger economies like the EU or the US, potentially eroding India’s ability to use public procurement as a lever for policy goals such as import substitution, domestic capacity-building, and employment generation, the think tank added.

Experts said that India seems to have conceded significantly on Intellectual Property Rights (IPR), as UK patent holders are now allowed to give voluntary licences, representing a marked shift from the earlier

stance.

“The IP chapter undermines policy space to facilitate access to medicines on two grounds. One, it explicitly mentions a preference for voluntary licensing over compulsory licensing. Two, it reiterates the European Free Trade Association (EFTA) provision which allows the patent holder to withhold information on the working of patents for three years,” an expert said on condition of anonymity.

India began exploring deal back in 2007

India and the UK (then part of the EU) began exploring the possibility of a trade deal back in 2007. However, Europe’s demands for access to India’s key job-generating sectors, such as automobiles and agriculture, were too steep for the government to build a consensus within the country, leading to the talks’ failure.

After deciding to withdraw from negotiations for the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) — a mega trade deal involving China, the ASEAN region, Australia, and New Zealand — over concerns about a surge in Chinese imports in 2019, India began looking to the lucrative West for deeper economic integration.

Diwali deadline missed and more

Post-2019, when India adopted a decisive approach towards a free trade agreement with the UK, a political crisis in London played spoilsport, beginning with Brexit in 2016. While negotiations continued under three different British Prime Ministers from 2022 to 2025, several deadlines were missed, including the Diwali deadline set by former UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson. The deal only materialised after the Keir Starmer-led Labour Party won a landslide vic-

tory in May 2025.

Another political push towards global deals was the election of US President Donald Trump. It incentivised countries to swiftly secure new markets, bringing the UK and India even closer in their search for certainty in a world that seems to be moving towards trade turmoil.

Shedding protectionism

The UK deal is significant as it marks the beginning of integration between the advanced services sector in the UK and that of India.

India has finally opened its doors to high-end British cars and whisky, albeit in a phased manner. The India-UK Free Trade Agreement ensures comprehensive market access for goods across all sectors, covering all of India’s export interests. India will benefit from tariff elimination on approximately 99 per cent of tariff lines, covering nearly 100 per cent of trade value — offering opportunities to boost bilateral trade between India and the UK, according to the Commerce and Industry Ministry.

The pact includes chapters on goods, services, innovation, government procurement, and intellectual property rights. The two countries have also concluded negotiations on the Double Contribution Convention Agreement, or social security pact, which would help avoid double contributions to social security funds by Indian professionals working for a limited period in Britain. However, talks on the Bilateral Investment Treaty (BIT) are still ongoing.

India’s exports to the UK rose by 12.6 per cent to \$14.5 billion, while imports grew by 2.3 per cent to \$8.6 billion in 2024-25. Bilateral trade between India and the UK increased to \$21.34 billion in 2023-24 from \$20.36 billion in 2022-23.

• Social security

Comprehensive and Economic Trade Agreement (CETA) that covers nearly 100 per cent of trade value between India and the UK. The DCC ensures employees moving between the two countries and their employers will only have to pay social security contributions in one country at a time. For temporary workers, the DCC ensures that “fragmentation of their social security record” does not occur, the UK government said on Thursday.

According to PM Narendra Modi, the DCC will inject “new energy” into the Indian and UK services sectors, particularly in technology and finance. “It will promote ease of doing business, reduce cost of doing business, and increase the confidence of doing business. Additionally, UK’s economy would benefit from India’s skilled talent. These agreements will enhance investments and generate new employment opportunities in both countries. Moreover, as agreements reached between two democracies and two of the world’s major economies, they will lend support to global stability and global prosperity,” Modi said at the joint briefing with his counterpart, Keir Starmer, on Thursday.

DCC does not cover access to social security benefits and does not change rules on access to benefits. The UK has agreements similar to the DCC with almost 50 countries. India, meanwhile, has such an understanding with 20 countries. According to British media reports, the exemption for India will cost the British government about £100 million.

As part of the trade deal, IT and IT-enabled services, financial and legal services, professional and educational services, and digital trade will get greater access to the UK market. “Indian professionals, including those deployed by companies to work in the UK across all services sectors, professionals deployed on contracts such as archi-

itects, engineers, chefs, yoga instructors and musicians, will benefit from simplified visa procedures and liberalised entry categories, making it easier for talent to work in the UK,” the Commerce Ministry said.

Services trade is key for India as it enjoys a surplus, compared to a heavy deficit when it comes to merchandise trade. In 2024-25, while India had a total merchandise trade deficit of \$287 billion with the rest of the world, it had a services trade surplus of \$189 billion. India’s services exports to the UK rose 16 per cent in 2024 to £14.7 billion, according to data from the Office of National Statistics, while services imports from the UK were flat at £10.1 billion.

The exemption on insurance payments to Indian employees temporarily working in the UK has been a source of friction in British politics for years. In 2022, the then Home Secretary, Suella Braverman, had expressed reservations about the trade deal with India, warning that it could lead to greater immigration to the UK, adding that Indians accounted for the largest number of those who overstayed their visas. More recently, after the deal was announced in May, shadow justice secretary Robert Jenrick said the social security contributions exemption was a sign that Starmer put British workers “last”. “This trade deal means Indian workers here for less than three years will not pay national insurance in the UK. Starmer has hiked national insurance on Brits while giving an exemption to Indian migrants. British workers come last in Starmer’s Britain,” he had said on X. However, the UK government said Thursday that the net impact of the DCC on the British economy was “significantly positive” and the cost of the DCC agreement “is likely to be a fraction of the overall deal’s economic benefit”. It said the DCC will not make it cheaper for UK firms to hire Indian workers and is not seen to have a long-term impact on net migration.

• Bank loan ‘fraud’ probe: ED searches locations linked to Anil Ambani

is searching 50 companies and 25 individuals under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA).

The ED is primarily investigating allegations of illegal diversion of loans worth around Rs 3,000 crore, disbursed by Yes Bank to the group’s companies between 2017 and 2019. It is also examining whether there was a quid pro quo involved in the loan — specifically, if bribes were paid to bank officials, including Yes Bank promoters.

A source said ED started its investigation on the basis of two FIRs registered by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) and other agencies and institutions. “Preliminary investigation conducted by the ED has revealed that there was a well-planned and thought out scheme to divert siphon off public money by cheating banks, shareholders, investors and other public institutions,” the source said.

The central agency’s probe has found alleged violations in Yes Bank’s loan approvals to the group’s companies, including backdated credit approval memorandums and proposals for investments made without any

due diligence or credit analysis — violations of the bank’s credit policy, among other issues.

Two group companies, Reliance Power and Reliance Infrastructure, said in separate but identical regulatory filings that the ED action has had “absolutely no impact” on their business operations, financial performance, shareholders, employees, or any other stakeholders. “The media reports appear to pertain to allegations concerning transactions of Reliance Communications Limited (RCOM) or Reliance Home Finance Limited (RHFL) which are over 10 years old,” the companies said.

When contacted, a Yes Bank official declined to comment.

Loans to “entities with weak financials; without proper documentation or due diligence; borrowers with common addresses, common directors; diversion of loans to promoter group entities; evergreening of GPC loans; onward lending on same date; loans disbursed on the date of application; loans disbursed prior to sanction; misrepresentation of financials” were among the alleged violations, said a

source. “In violation of the loan terms, these loans were further diverted to many group companies and shell companies,” the source said.

The central agency has also alleged that Reliance Mutual Fund invested around Rs 2,850 crore in AT1 bonds of Yes Bank in a suspected quid pro quo arrangement. “These bonds were eventually written down, and money was siphoned off. This was the money of the public — the mutual fund investors,” the source said, adding that the CBI is also investigating this issue.

Another source said that based on information from SEBI, the ED has found that Reliance Infrastructure diverted large sums of money to the group’s companies by disguising them as inter-corporate deposits (ICDs), using a related party called ‘C Company’ that was not previously disclosed. ICDs are short-term loans that companies within the same group often give each other. While legal, they can be used to route funds in ways that escape scrutiny — especially if the transactions aren’t properly documented or

disclosed.

“Reliance Infra did not disclose C Company as its related party in order to avoid approval from shareholders and the audit committee. It was also hidden, presumably to circumvent checks and balances imposed on related party transactions as per laws. It has been found that R Infra has taken a haircut of Rs 5,480 crore and only Rs 4 crore has been received in cash. The remaining Rs 6,499 crore has been settled in the form of assignment/ transfer of assets/ economic rights, mainly in certain discoms. These discoms did not have any business for many years and are not operational. Therefore, there are zero chances of recovery of this amount. The loan diversion in this case is over Rs 10,000 crore,” the source said.

The money laundering case stems from at least two CBI FIRs and reports shared by the National Housing Bank, SEBI, the National Financial Reporting Authority (NFRA), and Bank of Baroda with the ED, sources said.

Last year, SEBI banned Anil Ambani and 24 other entities — including former key managerial personnel of RHFL — from

the securities market for five years for diversion of funds from the company. SEBI also slapped a Rs 25 crore fine on Anil Ambani for allegedly orchestrating a fraudulent scheme that adversely affected RHFL’s stakeholders, as well as confidence in the integrity of governance structures in regulated financial sector entities. The total penalty imposed on Anil Ambani and the other 24 entities works out to over Rs 625 crore.

SEBI is also learnt to have shared its findings with the ED in the case of RHFL. “A dramatic increase in corporate loans by RHFL — from Rs 3,742.60 crore in FY 2017-18 to Rs 8,670.80 crore in FY 2018-19 — is also under the ED lens. Issues of irregular and expedited approvals, process deviations and many other illegalities have been found,” the source said.

In 2023, Anil Ambani was questioned by the ED in connection with alleged FEMA violations that surfaced during the Income Tax Department’s investigation into his alleged undeclared offshore assets amounting to Rs 800 crore.

Ban on old vehicles: Govt to study impact, may move court for review

SC to decide on fate of Bharat Stage VI vehicles in NCR next week

BASED ON the findings of the Transport and Environment departments on how a ban on end-of-life vehicles (ELVs) would affect the general public and all stakeholders, the Delhi government may move a review petition before the Supreme Court seeking a recall of the order that does not allow diesel vehicles older than 10 years and petrol vehicles older than 15 years to ply in the National Capital Region (NCR), Environment Minister Manjinder Singh Sirsa has said.

"Environment and Transport departments are studying the guidelines, the impact on the public, benefits and consequences on ground and air quality levels... The departments are working on this separately... Once they complete their studies and submit reports, the government will study and take further decision on filing a petition in the court," the minister said.

According to officials, in their reports, the departments will also mention the measures they have undertaken in the last five months to curb air pollution in Delhi, how they have fared and their future plans.

The Supreme Court, meanwhile, said on Thursday that it will examine next week whether vehicles meeting the Bharat Stage (BS) VI emission standards can be allowed to operate in the NCR even after they have completed their life period.

The announcement was made after a plea raising the question was mentioned before a bench of

Chief Justice of India BR Gavai and Justice Vinod Chandran. Seeking an urgent hearing, the counsel who mentioned it said the SC itself had set the periods for which the vehicles can ply, and so the court's direction was needed for any modification.

To fight air pollution, the National Green Tribunal (NGT) had in 2015 ordered that diesel vehicles older than 10 years and petrol vehicles older than 15 years should not be allowed to run in the NCR. This was subsequently upheld by the Supreme Court in 2018.

The Transport department, in 2021-2022, had started de-registering the old petrol and diesel

vehicles. In 2023, the department launched an enforcement drive against these vehicles that were found parked in public places or plying illegally on roads. However, several vehicle owners moved court, which asked the government to come up with proper guidelines to handle ELVs in Delhi.

This July, the Delhi government tried to implement a fuel ban on ELVs, but the attempt was met with opposition from the public, following which the move was put on hold.

Citing "critical operational and infrastructural challenges", the government had asked the Centre's Commission for Air Quality Management to put the fuel ban "on hold with immediate effect". Sirsa had said that implementing the ban only in Delhi and not the whole of NCR would "dilute the impact and shift the burden unfairly".

Lieutenant Governor V K Saxena, too, had written to the chief minister, asking the government to move a review petition before the SC against its 2018 order. "How can a vehicle banned as unfit in Delhi run lawfully in other cities? This is against equal treatment," the L-G had said in his letter.

'Will reduce opportunities for reels': Police request SC to set up special courts in jails to try gangsters

THE DELHI Police Thursday requested the Supreme Court to examine if dedicated court complexes can be established within jail premises to conduct trials in criminal gang-related offences, with charges yet to be framed in over 60% of cases.

In an affidavit filed Wednesday, DCP (Outer North) Hareeshwar V Swami said one of the reasons for the proposition is to reduce "opportunities for generation of reels and other social media content glamourising lives of criminals, which are observed when gang-related criminals are transported from jails to court complexes".

Police also said there would be fewer opportunities or grounds for these criminals to seek bail on grounds of delay, better control over safety and security measures — including for witnesses and accused persons — and "timely invocation of special statutes" such as the Maharashtra Control of Organised Crime Act (MCOCA), the National Security Act (NSA), etc, if dedicated court complexes are set up inside jail premises.

As per the affidavit, the primary reason for delays in conducting trial proceedings is that presently, "designated courts handle other routine matters such as IPC/BNS offences, EOW matters, ED cases, etc, burdening them with multiple sensitive matters".

They have also attributed the delay to the fact that most cases registered against these gang members are under the Indian Penal Code (IPC), and are being tried under Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPc) whereas it is the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS) that includes provisions of speedy and expeditious trial, which remains unavailable "for majority of trials".

Meanwhile, on Thursday, while hearing a bail plea of a man facing 55 criminal cases, the top court underlined that the trial in cases involving hardened criminals is being delayed deliberately to make time to win over witnesses. It said "there should not be any misplaced sympathy with gangsters" and called for establishing more fast-track courts to expedite such cases.

During the hearing, the bench of Justices Surya Kant and Joymalya Bagchi questioned the law and order scenario in the NCR outside Delhi. "In the NCR, just go out of the geographical belt of

Delhi and see what is happening in Faridabad, Gurgaon, etc. A man was arrested from Ghaziabad, who committed a murder in Panipat. There should be no misplaced sympathy for these gangsters. Society needs to get rid of them," Justice Kant said.

He also asked, "What is happening in NCR, Haryana?" "Broad daylight murder (happens) on the street and the person goes scot-free due to lack of evidence... Rule of law is absolutely impaired in the eyes of the common man..."

Perusing an affidavit which gave statistics of pending cases against gangsters, Justice Kant pointed out that there are 288 such pending cases in the NCT of Delhi, and that in 180 of them, charges are yet to be framed.

Pointing to the need for setting up more courts to fast-track these cases, Justice Kant said this can happen only if the Union and Delhi governments decide to act.

"... there will have to be an appropriate strength of courts to ensure these cases can be aptly distributed and their trials can proceed on a day-to-day basis. If such decision is taken by apt authorities, it seems to us that all pending trials can be brought to an end..." the court said.

GHAZIABAD Bajrang Dal member held for abusing Blinkit staff for delivery of chicken during Shravan

A MEMBER of the Bajrang Dal was arrested by the Ghaziabad Police on Thursday for allegedly insulting and intimidating an assistant manager of Blinkit — a quick commerce company — for delivering chicken during the month of Shravan, police said.

Ghaziabad (City) Deputy Commissioner of Police Dhawal Jaiswal identified the accused as Manoj Verma. "We have begun a probe into the incident," he said, adding that a court has sent Verma to judicial custody.

Vijay Nagar Assistant Commissioner of Police Ritesh Tripathi said Verma was arrested after the Blinkit assistant manager, Monish, filed a police complaint on Wednesday.

In his complaint, Monish alleged that Verma, along with his associates, had come to the Blinkit store at Siddharth Vihar in Vijay Nagar on July 15.

"He came between 4 pm and 5 pm and started abusing our fleet manager, Abhay, saying that he was getting chicken delivered in the month of Shravan," Monish wrote in the complaint, adding that they were threatened that if Abhay did not stop, Verma would kill him and get the store closed.

Meanwhile, in a purported video that has gone viral on social media, Verma and one other person could be seen stopping a Blinkit delivery agent, Ritu Raj, who was on a bike, on Wednesday — hours before the police complaint was filed. In the video, Verma is seen asking Raj to show the parcel he was carrying. On finding raw chicken, Verma asks Raj to call the customer.

When the customer picks up, Verma is heard saying on the phone — "Today, it is Tuesday and Shravan too. We are trying to ensure that less non-veg is sold. We are from Bajrang Dal and this is our work..." When the customer on the other end tells him that she is a Christian, Verma lets Raj go.

DELHI PROSECUTORS WELFARE ASSOCIATION DATA

Delhi's trial courts running with half the public prosecutors they require

DELHI'S TRIAL courts are functioning with just half the public prosecutors they need, data accessed by *The Indian Express* shows.

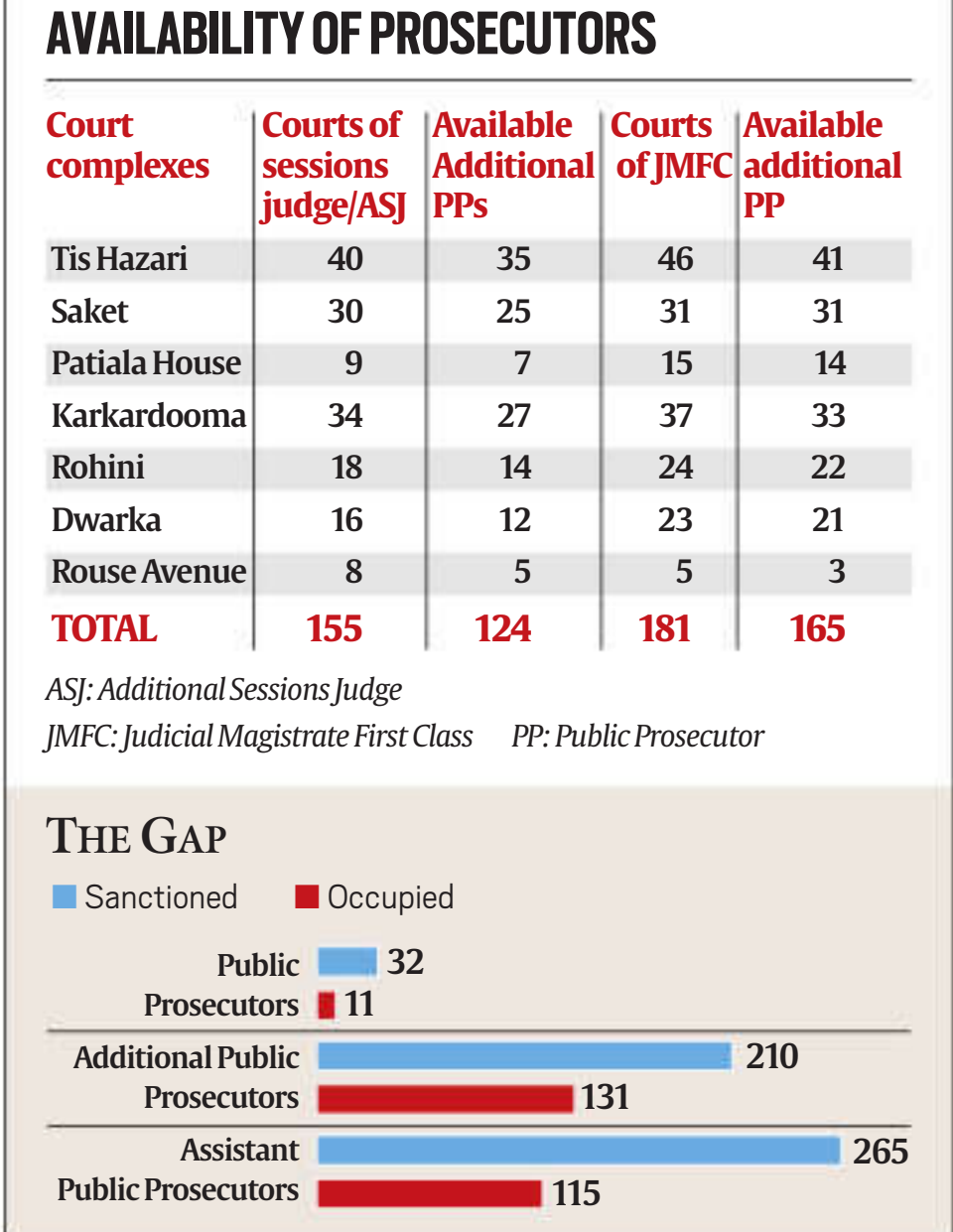
While 507 posts for public prosecutors, additional public prosecutors, and assistant public prosecutors are sanctioned, just 257 have been filled, i.e., 50.6%, data furnished by the Delhi Prosecutors Welfare Association (DPWA) reveals.

This shortage in the number of lawyers who represent the state was flagged by the Delhi High Court a week ago when it directed the state government to start ad-hoc appointment of public prosecutors "to guarantee the smooth functioning of criminal courts".

As per DPWA data, while the sanctioned posts for public prosecutors, and assistant public prosecutors stand at 32, 210, and 265, respectively, the total number of posts filled is just 11, 131, and 115. (*see box*)

Data also reveals that 54 assistant public prosecutors are working on a contractual basis.

A week ago, a HC division bench of Chief Justice D K Upadhyaya and Justice Anish Dayal had directed that "neces-



sary measures be taken to ensure ad-hoc appointments are made, pending regular recruitments, to guarantee the smooth functioning of criminal courts and ensure the availability of one public prosecutor for each court".

The bench was hearing a suo motu case registered in 2009 on the prolonged incarceration of undertrials.

DPWA data suggests that there is not even one public prosecutor available per court. While there are 155 courts of additional

THE DELHI Jal Board (DJB) informed the National Green Tribunal (NGT) on Wednesday that it has withdrawn the 10% rebate on water bills that 119 cooperative group housing societies in the Capital were to receive, as they do not have functioning rainwater harvesting systems.

The DJB said that it had formally withdrawn the rebate benefit from the housing societies in March. The move came after the board, during its survey and sampling drive, found widespread violations and groundwater contamination in these societies, owing to faulty and neglected rainwater harvesting (RWH) pits.

In January, DJB had submitted a list of 176 societies in Dwarka whose RWH systems were inspected, to the Delhi Pollution Control Committee (DPCC).

Among these, faecal coliform was detected in 115 societies' pits, and in four others, the RWH systems were found to be non-functional.

The DJB had written to the DPCC, recommending environmental compensation against the defaulting societies, citing violations under the Environment (Protection) Act, 1986. "In most of

SEVERAL CLAIM THEIR FAMILY MEMBERS DETAINED, ASK: ‘WHY DO THEY THINK WE ARE BANGLADESHIS?’

Bengali-speaking migrant workers pack up, leave Gurgaon after police verification scare

“Hum log bangali bolte hain toh Bangladeshi ban gaye kya (If we speak Bengali, does that make us Bangladeshi)?” said Chavi Bibi (39) as she stared at the ‘holding centre’ where her husband has been allegedly detained for the last three days.

“Two days ago, I managed to get a glimpse of him, but they closed the gates and windows.”

Like Bibi’s husband, several families alleged their loved ones were rounded up by the Gurgaon Police as part of a ‘routine verification’ drive to identify Bangladeshis and Rohingya living illegally in the city. The move has sparked fear among the Bengali-speaking migrant community — several have left the city or are preparing to leave.

The ‘holding centre’ was inside a community centre in Sector 40. Along the boundary walls were a few policemen — some sat on chairs, others were making grounds.

Asked why people were being rounded up, one of the police officers said, “It is a routine check. All the facilities are there inside — food, water and shelter. They will be let go once the checks are complete.”

Keeping vigil at the gate, Bibi recounted how her husband was picked up. “They came around 2 pm a week ago when we were eating. They did not even let him change into proper clothes. They did not tell us where he was for three days. Then I got a call from him saying he was in Badshahpur, then Sohna, then Subhash Chowk, then here. He was picked

up because he had two Aadhaar cards, one with an updated address as he had to link it to a bank account here,” she alleged.

“Our sarpanch back home called me, saying they have sought verification for your husband... We have all documents.”

The family said they are from Malda in West Bengal. Bibi works as a cook in homes while her husband does odd jobs, including walking dogs. The couple has two daughters, aged 17 and 9.

A police spokesperson said that eight Bangladeshis have been detected in the exercise so far and they will be deported.

Around 6 km away in Sector 50, at the slum in the Gada market area, behind Nirvana Country and DPS International School, things were more grim.

Mehta Ali, 50, originally from Dakshin Dinajpur district, said migrant workers like him have lived here for at least three years.

“Pura darr ka mahaul hain (There is fear in the air). 150 of us

have already left. I have also booked train tickets for my family and I; we will leave today. No one was detained from here, but still...”

Videos circulating online allegedly showing detainees being beaten have heightened fears among the community. “Have we come here to get beaten? We came here looking for work, not to fight over our documentary proof. We stay awake all night now, alert. My brother-in-law has been detained for nine days,” alleged Farukh Sarkar, 26.

The slum’s male residents are masons and labourers, while the women are domestic help.

Another resident said the raids have affected their children too. “We were first taken to a community centre near Shani Mandir, then to a station. If there is even one typo in our documents, they tag us Bangladeshi.

For three days, our children have not gone to school once we got to know our community is being targeted,” said Dholu Mia, 42.

A resident of a housing society nearby, whose help lived in the area, said, “My domestic help was taken into custody along with her husband Tuesday. She has a differently abled son; she cannot just vacate so easily.”

At the Yadav Chaupal area in Sector 28 in Chakkarpur, Adam Ali (38) said he was picked up late Sunday night and released early Wednesday morning. “Even though we had Aadhaar cards, they questioned and held us for three days, including at the Sector 40 community centre,” he said.

Mansoor Khatun, 32, and Tumpa Bibi, 30, whose male family members were detained, said they haven’t been able to rest peacefully at night: “We are from West Bengal. Why do the police think we are Bangladeshis?”

At Bengali Market in Sector 49, migrant workers from West Bengal were leaving their slum in panic, having packed their luggage and booked train tickets. The area hosts a sizeable num-

ber of migrants from the state; men work as sanitation workers and women as domestic help.

Police, however, maintained that the drive is being carried out based on government orders.

According to the police spokesperson, “We received directives from the Union Home Ministry for the verification exercise of suspected foreigners living illegally. We are verifying documents and antecedents of people from their local District Magistrate concerned.”

“Genuine citizens need not fear or flee the city; there is no need to panic.”

He also denied allegations of violence against those held. “We have CCTVs at all holding centres and stations where they are being questioned. We have not received any complaint from any family member or those held.”

Gurgaon DCP (Headquarters) Dr Arpit Jain said due process is being thoroughly followed. “This is an all-India exercise. Many have already been released promptly after swift verification.”

Gurgaon MLA and BJP leader Mukesh Sharma supported the verification drive. “The Rohingyas have negatively affected the law and order situation in Gurgaon, we all know. They set up jhuggis (here) and their numbers increase, they have a system to get documents made.”

Asked about domestic help who are genuine citizens belonging to West Bengal being picked up, he said, “See, as directions have come from the (Union) government, we have to support the drive. The government and police are working based on their intel; let the checking be thorough.”

‘52 from West Bengal detained in Haryana’

AT LEAST 52 people from West Bengal have been detained in Haryana on suspicion of being illegal migrants from Bangladesh, sources in the state government said. Most of those detained hail from Nadia, Murshidabad, and Malda districts, they added.

“We are verifying the names and checking the details before sending them to our counterparts in Haryana through email. They (Haryana police) are looking into it and also releasing the migrant workers once the documents prove them to be residents of West Bengal,” Superintendent of Police (Murshidabad) Kumar Sunny Raj said.

According to R Kaleem Ullah, national vice-president of All India Sramik Swaraj Kendra (AISSK) that works for migrant workers, those detained are mostly garbage collectors and some work as domestic helps. “The migrants are mainly from Nadia, Murshidabad and Malda districts. On March 24, and then on April 4, shanties of migrants were demolished in Gurgaon. Since then, hundreds of them are leaving Haryana,” Ullah told *The Indian Express* over the phone from Bengaluru.

Meanwhile, TMC MPs plan to highlight the issue of detention of Bengali-speaking migrants in the ongoing Monsoon session of Parliament.

‘Waste collectors have fled’: Gurgaon RWAs stare at sanitation crisis

AS BENGALI-SPEAKING migrant workers leave the city following reports of several being picked up during the Gurgaon Police’s verification drive to identify suspected foreigners, housing societies that depended on them for sanitation services are struggling.

“We had six to seven door-to-door collectors... They spoke Bengali and had all documents. Out of fear, they have stopped coming for the past 8-10 days; some have headed home. We are now struggling to train the new staff we had to hire, to get garbage cleared on time. It is like Covid all over again,” said Kusum Sharma, Residents’ Welfare Association (RWA) member of Suncity township in Sector 54 along the Golf Course Road.

“This arrangement has been in place for six years. Why was this sudden crackdown carried out without putting in place alternative measures?” she added.

“Even domestic help are scared to come to work now.”

The situation is similar in Sector 23A. RWA General Secretary Bhawani Shankar Tripathy said door-to-door waste collection has been disrupted for more than a week now.

“The day the police operation began, they (workers) disappeared. The cart operators, who were Bengali speaking, are gone... the one remaining vehicle operator is overwhelmed and effectively works on alternate days now... Waste is piling up in vacant plots and greenbelt areas.”

Road sweeping has also taken a hit, he added. “The staff, reduced from 27 to 20 after a contract re-

newal, now comprises only two women. It is humanly impossible for two people to clean 2 km every day. They manage only 300-500m daily, alternating sections. Even the park dustbins are overflowing now, as people have started dumping their waste there.”

RWAs like Ardee City in Sector 52, which house 2,500 families, have arranged for their own pickup truck with four new workers. “Our 12 earlier door-to-door collectors have fled. We have now invested in a public announcement system, and coordinate through WhatsApp as to when the truck reaches a lane so people can come to give the garbage,” said Chaitali Mandhotra, Ardee City RWA member.

Speaking with *The Indian Express*, Municipal Corporation of Gurugram Commissioner Pradeep Dahiya acknowledged that sanitation operations in some areas had initially been affected.

“We have been swiftly deploying alternative arrangements (in terms of workforce) that were already in place. The issue is being faced by those sectors that had arrangements with private players who would employ (migrant workers) from the informal sector,” he said.

CM rolls out new health system for govt hospitals

PATIENTS CAN now make doctor’s appointments, get lab reports, view and pay their medical bills at Delhi’s government hospitals — all through a single digital platform, said Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta as she digitally inaugurated the Hospital Information Management System (HIMS) on Thursday.

“Appointments can be scheduled from home, eliminating long queues. Once a patient presents their health card, treatment can begin immediately,” she said.

Along with the HIMS, Gupta also launched 34 new Ayushman Arogya Mandirs, and 8 new Jan Aushadhi Kendras (JAKs).

Addressing the event at the Delhi Secretariat, the CM said over 93 lakh ABHA IDs (Ayushman Bharat Health Account IDs) have also been created, providing every resident with a digital health card. “This card will allow citizens to access medical services in any hospital, anywhere, based on their medical history,” she noted.

While inaugurating the Ayushman Arogya Mandirs, the CM said, the new centres will soon be dedicated to the public by MLAs in their respective constituencies.

The government is planning to open 15 Ayushman Arogya Mandirs in every constituency operating as primary health centres, offering multiple lab tests and essential services, she added.

The event also saw Health Minister Dr Pankaj Kumar Singh announcing the government’s plans to establish 1,139 Ayushman Arogya Mandirs across the Capital.

The CM also claimed that corruption in medicine procurement has been effectively eliminated. “All purchases are now processed digitally. We addressed the issue of overpriced medicines earlier by opening Jan Aushadhi Kendras. To strengthen healthcare delivery, we have also initiated permanent recruitment. Over 1,350 nursing positions that had remained vacant for over a decade have now been filled,” she added.

TRAFFIC CURBS STARTING TODAY

Sarita Vihar flyover repairs to finally begin

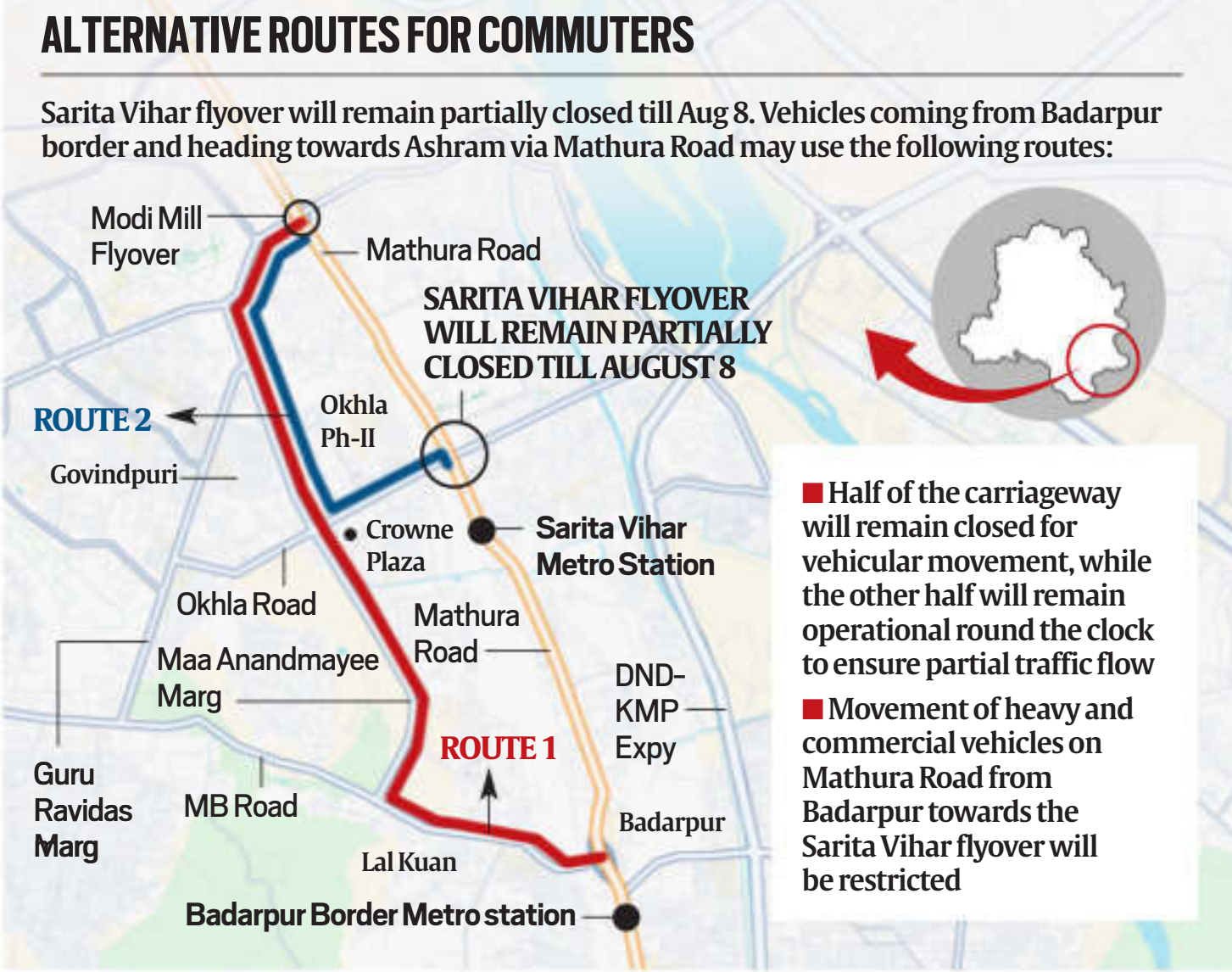
THOSE TRAVELLING to and from Southeast Delhi and beyond will have to brace for traffic disruption as repairs on the Sarita Vihar flyover will be carried out by the Public Works Department, starting Friday.

The flyover will remain partially closed till August 8. During this period, half of the carriageway will remain closed for vehicular movement, while the other half will remain operational round the clock to ensure partial traffic flow.

Commuters travelling from Badarpur and Faridabad towards South Delhi will be impacted the most. Residents of Sarita Vihar, Okhla, and Govindpuri, too, will face the brunt.

Talk of repairs has been going on since 2023, but it never took off. Last October, the Traffic Police had shared an advisory, but the work never saw the light of day owing to issues with the contractor and the previous government.

The Delhi Traffic Police issued an advisory on Thursday



morning asking commuters to make prior arrangements and plan their journey in advance. Traffic officials said move-

ment of heavy and commercial vehicles on Mathura Road from Badarpur towards the Sarita Vihar flyover will be restricted.

The Kalindi Kunj road and Sarita Vihar flyover had recently faced heavy traffic owing to the Kanwar Yatra.

Gole Market restoration set to begin, brace for traffic curbs for 6 months beginning today

THE DELHI Traffic Police has issued a comprehensive traffic advisory in light of the upcoming conservation and restoration work at the historic Gole Market building.

Starting July 25, major traffic restrictions and diversions will be in place around the Gole Market roundabout and Bhai Veer Singh Marg for an estimated period of six months, traffic officials said.

The civic project, spearheaded by the New Delhi Municipal Council (NDMC), includes the restoration of the Gole Market as a museum, along with the redevelopment of the surrounding area, construction of a subway, and a new service block.

The market, a 12-sided marvel with six entrances and a central courtyard, will be the first-of-its-kind museum in the country dedicated to women

The market, which had fallen into disrepair after being closed for over a decade, will be retrofitted with conservation efforts at a projected cost of Rs 21.66 crore, an NDMC statement said last year.

Authorities have warned that additional traffic diversions or regulations may be implemented in accordance with evolving on-ground requirements and the progress of construction work.

Commuters are encouraged to avoid the affected stretches altogether and use public transport where possible to ease congestion.

The Delhi Transport Corporation (DTC) is also considering modifying certain bus routes to help bypass the construction zone and maintain the smooth flow of public transportation.

Passengers heading to crucial transit points like IGI Airport, New Delhi Railway Station, or ISBTs are urged to plan their journeys in advance, said officials.

SHALIN DAN had always dreamed of studying at St Stephen’s College. When he was admitted to its BSc Mathematics (Honours) programme three years ago, it felt like a goal fulfilled. But now, with Delhi University (DU) transitioning into a four-year undergraduate format in line with National Education Policy, 2020, Dan has chosen not to continue.

“The first batch is always a trial batch,” said the 22-year-old, who now works as a merchandiser at a private firm. “Seminars were held in our college, but even faculty members couldn’t answer many of our questions. Especially in Mathematics, it didn’t make sense to go in blindly without a clear research path.”

Dan is part of a cohort of science students across DU choosing to exit their undergraduate courses at the end of the third year, despite the opportunity to pursue a research-intensive fourth year and graduate with an ‘Honours with Research’ degree.

According to DU records, the fourth year — at least in this initial rollout — is being embraced more readily by students of Humanities and Languages programmes than those in Sciences and Commerce.

As of last week, 9,674 students across DU have opted to exit early, according to data accessed by *The Indian Express*. The last date to make the choice is July 31.

Tripti Mittal, (20), a BSc Mathematics (Hons) student at St Stephen’s College, has chosen to stay on.

“I want to pursue a PhD in Mathematics. With the fourth year, I can bypass a full Master’s programme... In seminars, we were told we can choose any topic in our subject of research,” she said.

At Miranda House — consistently ranked among DU’s top five colleges by the National Institutional Ranking Framework — between 40% to 60% students of Science stu-

dents have chosen to exit the undergraduate programme after three years. In Humanities, the figure is notably lower, with only 25%-35% of students of Political Science and History choosing to leave.

In the Commerce stream, too, not many are opting for the fourth year.

At Shri Ram College of Commerce, the most-preferred DU college, only 170 of 900 BCom (Honours) and 74 of 210 Economics (Honours) students are opting for the fourth year.

At Hindu College, another top-ranking DU college, Principal Anju Srivastava said that interest varies with subject.

“In Sciences, around 30-35% students have expressed interest in the fourth year. History and Political Science may see more than 30% staying on, but Sociology and Philosophy may not see many takers. While English and Economics have more than 35% of the students opting to continue, Commerce may see less interest,” she added.

At Kirori Mal College, the split is nearly even. As of Wednesday, 472 students had opted to exit while 455 have chosen to stay on. The highest number of students exiting at the college are 66 in BCom and 60 in BCom (Hons) out of the 472.

In Sciences, specific departments are witnessing a sharper decline. In Physics, 40 students have exited, followed by Chemistry (38) and

Mathematics (6). By comparison, in BSc Programme Physical Sciences (with Chemistry), 38 students have chosen to leave.

The contrast is sharper when Languages are considered. While Hindi and Sanskrit have seen two students each opting out, four students have decided not to pursue Urdu, suggesting a stronger interest in research among students.

Kirori Mal College Principal Dinesh Khattar said the mixed response was understandable. “It is quite natural for students to have a little insecurity. This is the first batch. They are bound to have doubts,” he said.

“So far, it looks like a 50-50 split across courses, but these numbers might change in the coming week.”

At Ramjas College, Principal Ajay Arora said, “About 45-50% students would like to continue with the fourth year. This percentage is almost consistent across every course, including Humanities, Sciences, and Languages.” He added that more than 50% of Chemistry students are staying on.

The principal from a prominent North Campus college admitted that students of Sciences are harder to retain for the fourth year.

Many of them are either taking up jobs or opting for MA programmes elsewhere... Interestingly, students of Languages are showing more interest in research.”

371 posts of judges vacant in various high courts: Govt

New Delhi: A total of 371 posts of judges are vacant in various HCs and HC collegiums have not sent any recommendation yet for more than 50% of these vacancies, RS was informed Thursday. The government said while HCs are required to make recommendations at least 6 months before occurrence of a vacancy, this time limit is "rarely observed". In a written reply to a question by LoP Mallikarjun Kharge, Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal said that as on July 18, against sanctioned strength of 1,122 judges, 751 are working and 178 proposals for appointment are at various stages of processing between government and the SC Collegium, Meghwal said. Recommendations for 193 vacancies are yet to be received from HC collegiums, he said. **PTI**

3 types of small modular reactors being developed

New Delhi: India is developing three types of small modular reactors mostly in the form of captive plants for energy-intensive industries, Union Minister Jitendra Singh said Thursday. "In-principle approval has been obtained for construction of these demonstration reactors. These demonstration reactors are likely to be constructed in 60 to 72 months after receipt of administrative sanction," he said in a written reply to RS. **PTI**

No plan to remove 'socialist', 'secular' from the Preamble, says Law Minister

Govt hasn't initiated any legal process to remove the words: Meghwal in RS

UNION Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal acknowledged in Rajya Sabha Thursday that "certain groups" were advocating for the removal of the words "socialist" and "secular" from the Preamble to the Constitution, but said that the government did not have any current plan or intention to do so. In a written reply to a question raised by SP MP Ramji Lal Suman, Meghwal said: "The Indian government has not formally initiated any legal or constitutional process to remove the words 'socialist' and 'secular' from the Preamble of the Constitution. While there may be discussions or debates in certain public or political circles, no formal decision or proposal has been announced by the government regarding amendments to these terms."

The minister's statement comes a month after RSS general secretary Dattatreya Hosabale said at an event that a discussion was merited on the words "socialist" and "secular", which were added to the Preamble during the Emergency.

SP MP Suman had sought Meghwal's response on whether "office-bearers of some social organisations" were creating an "atmosphere" for the removal of the two words from the Preamble.

Making a distinction between the call by the RSS leader and the government's position, Meghwal said: "Regarding the atmosphere created by office-bearers of some social organisations, it is possible that certain groups are expressing opinions or advocating for reconsideration of these words. Such activities can create a public discourse or atmosphere around the issue, but this does not necessarily re-

fect the official stance or actions of the government."

The minister also cited a Supreme Court decision in November 2024 in Dr Balram Singh and others Vs Union of India, in which the court dismissed petitions challenging the 42nd Constitutional amendment. "The court clarified that 'socialism' in the Indian context signifies a welfare state and does not impede private sector growth, while 'secularism' is in-

tegral to the Constitution's basic structure," Meghwal said.

Asked about the government's stand on the issue, the minister said: "The government's official stand is that there is no current plan or intention to reconsider or remove the words 'socialism' and 'secularism' from the Preamble of the Constitution. Any discussions regarding amendments to the Preamble would require thorough deliberation and broad consensus, but

as of now, the government has not initiated any formal process to change these provisions."

Though it was a starred question and Meghwal was present in the Upper House, it was not taken up as the proceedings were adjourned due to disruptions when Question Hour began.

On June 26, Hosabale, while speaking at the launch of a book on the 50th anniversary of the Emergency imposed by the Indira Gandhi government in 1975, called on the Congress to apologise for the Emergency and asserted that there should be a discussion on removing the words "socialist" and "secular" added to the Preamble through the 42nd amendment in 1976.

"No attempt was made to remove them (socialist and secular) later. So, there should be a discussion on whether they should remain. I say this in a building (Ambedkar International Centre) named after Babasaheb Ambedkar, whose Constitution did not have these words in the Preamble," he said at the event.

As Opp keeps up protest against SIR, both Houses adjourned for day

Banging tables not tradition of your party, Birla tells Venugopal

AMID PERSISTENT protests from Opposition against the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls in Bihar, both Houses of Parliament were adjourned for the fourth day Thursday.

In the morning, Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla appealed to Opposition members to maintain decorum after they raised slogans and also displayed placards.

Birla said, "... You are members of such an old political party, which has contributed to this House and its decorum. The people from your party will see your behaviour in the House. You bring placards, raise slogans, bang tables. This is not as per decorum."

Mentioning Congress MP KC Venugopal, Birla said, "This is the biggest democracy. What kind of message are you sending to the country's democratic institutions?... Bringing placards, banging tables, these are not traditions of your party... People have not sent you here to bring placards, and bang tables." Amid the din, Birla adjourned the proceedings in less than seven minutes.

When the LS reconvened at 2

pm, Krishna Prasad Tenneti, who was in the Chair, urged MPs to participate in a discussion on the Bill The Readjustment of Representation of Scheduled Tribes in Assembly Constituencies of the State of Goa Bill, 2024, which seeks to provide seats for STs in the Goa Assembly.

Union Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal questioned the Opposition for not allowing discussion. "The Opposition is not cooperating. It means they do not want to discuss (the issues) in the interests of STs," he said. As the protests continued, proceedings were adjourned for the day.

In the RS, Deputy Chairman Harivansh adjourned the House till 2 pm amid protests by Opposition. When the House sat again, Bhuwaneshwar Kalita, who was in the Chair, urged the MPs to begin a discussion on the Carriage of Goods by Sea Bill but amid sloganeering by Opposition members, proceedings were adjourned within 15 minutes.

AIADMK's Thambidurai and YSRCP's Alla Ayodhya Rami Reddy spoke on the Bill but were barely audible amid slogans. BJP MP Laxmikant Bajpai urged the Chair to take action against the Opposition MPs under Rule 235 (ii). Congress's Pramod Tiwari said LoP Mallikarjun Kharge should be allowed to speak. "... The LoP is on his feet but you are not giving him a chance to speak, nor are you giving any assurance..." The Chair then adjourned the House.

Why Congress, Opp shying away from a debate?

What do you have to say about the Opposition's uproar over Bihar voter rolls revision?

The Opposition has the right to ask questions, including occasionally creating ruckus as well. But how long will it continue? (LoP, Lok Sabha) Rahul Gandhi says he is not being allowed to speak but his party is in the forefront of creating chaos in the House. Why is Congress and the Opposition shying away from a debate on any issue?... We go and sit and come back. It is agonising, painful and disgusting, to say the least. The whole nation watches us. You can question us in any powerful debate and make us uncomfortable, and we are

equally competent to reply to all your debates to make you uncomfortable. Why don't you allow the debate to happen? And then you complain — 'meri awaaz shaant ki jaati hai' (my voice is being silenced)'.

Why is the debate not being taken up?

The larger question is: are they interested in debate? Every debate has to be structured as per Parliamentary rules. Has 16 hours not been allocated for the Operation Sindoor debate, with nine hours in the Rajya Sabha? That is the way the House functions. You ask for a debate, it will be accepted, it will be prepared. You unleash a big attack, we will respond... As far as SIR is concerned, I will



raise some questions. To be a voter you have to be a citizen of India — can the EC examine it or not? To be a voter you have to be an ordinary resident of an area. Can the EC examine that or not... Today there are lakhs of votes of people who are dead or have migrated to other areas... What is the problem if these things are being examined by the EC? They (Opposition) sometimes claim

there is a faulty voter list. And now when revision is being done, they have a problem. Once the draft publication is done, you have a right to file objections, to appeal to the collector, to file a second appeal for revision before the Chief Electoral Officer. So many mechanisms are available.

RJD leader Tejashwi Yadav has said the Mahagathabandhan may take a call to "boycott Bihar polls" in view of the SIR exercise?

I believe that is a casual comment. I will only tell him, 'young man, don't shy away from a fight'. As for Rahul Gandhi's venomous attack on EC, I will say one thing in Hindi: 'Agar aap ko vote nahin milta to hum

kya karenin (What do we do if people don't vote for you)?"

Even JD(U) MP Giridhari Yadav has questioned the SIR exercise...

I don't want to make any comments on individual members. I know that Nitish Kumar, the whole JD(U) and the entire NDA is one.

Some critics say in a state like Bihar the exercise can be a huge inconvenience and end up disenfranchising many voters...

Haven't 98% of people already filled out the form? Or may be 99%? Just tell me. People know their rights, people know their obligations and they are following it.

As Jagdeep Dhankhar exits as Vice-President, where will the chips fall?

Weekly insight into what's changing in national politics — and why

THE MORE you look at it, the clearer it becomes. The resignation of Jagdeep Dhankhar as Vice-President is for reasons other than indifferent health.

Though the now former Vice-President has had health problems of late — he fainted in Uttarakhand in June and was hospitalised with a heart ailment in March — had medical reasons been the decisive factor, the announcement would have been made differently and not on the V-P's X handle at the end of an action-packed day that saw him preside over the Rajya Sabha and the Business Advisory Council.

As information filters in, it is evident that the resignation would not have come about had there not been serious differences between Dhankhar and the top government leadership. This was a big shift from last December, when the Opposition, accusing him of being partisan in his inimitably outspoken and sometimes brash manner, filed a notice to move an impeachment resolution against him.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's words of farewell to Dhankhar also told their own story. In a concise statement, the PM, wishing him well, spoke of the "many opportunities" Dhankhar had received to serve the country in "various capacities". There was no mention of his contributions.

Unlike the Congress that suddenly found a new love for Dhankhar — the party's communications chief Jairam Ramesh urged him to reconsider the decision, though senior leader P

Chidambaram clarified it was not the official position — the government lost no time in accepting his resignation and formally notifying it within hours. There was also no intimation of a farewell for the man whom the ruling alliance had effusively welcomed as "kisan putra (farmer's son)" after his election in 2022.

The alacrity with which Dhankhar, as Raya Sabha Chairman, accepted the Opposition's notice on July 20 to remove Justice Yashwant Varma — wads of cash were found at the High Court judge's Delhi home in March — is said to have not sat well with the government. Dhankhar's decision, about which he is learnt to have not consulted the government, was seen as an attempt to upstage the BJP's plan to bring the motion in the Lok Sabha along with Opposition MPs. Though the motion to remove a judge can be initiated in either House of Parliament, the government had hoped that the removal

of the judge would be by "consensus" and not viewed as partisan.

Dhankhar accepting the Opposition notice had the fat in the fire. On the evening of July 21, BJP leaders met groups of ruling party MPs, with murmurs abound that Dhankhar had exceeded his brief. The day ended with his resignation.

Perhaps not the sole reason for Dhankhar's exit, this was probably the last straw that broke the camel's back. Someone who met the now former V-P in recent weeks say he spoke critically of the ruling party's leadership, and the words must have reached them. The larger-than-life profile he had acquired with his outspo-

kenness, particularly his criticism of the judiciary, and the tendency to be frequently in the headlines, are also said to have not gone down well with the BJP brass.

At the end of the day, it is believed that the BJP could not risk the Rajya Sabha slipping out of its control with important legislation on the cards. As the Rajya Sabha Chairman, the V-P has enormous powers even as he is required to move in step with the ruling party. The Chairman cannot be in conflict with the government and also has to take the Opposition along.

This became increasingly difficult for Dhankhar to navigate as time went on, as he was seen as partisan and polarising. Since the Opposition's attempt to introduce the no-confidence motion, Dhankhar tried to reach out to them. He was photographed with leading Opposition figures, including Arvind Kejriwal, and having meetings with Mallikarjun Kharge. On what turned out to be Dhankhar's

last day in the job, the Congress president was allowed to address the House on Pahalgaon and Operation Sindoor even though the discussion was billed for a later date. All of this also likely did not sit well with the ruling side.

It is not as if there have not been differences between the government and the V-P before. It was sometime in 2001 when the House stalled for a day after L K Advani urged then V-P Krishan Kant to adjourn proceedings sine die. Kant told the then Home Minister that it was a political decision for the government to take, and would do the needful if both the Centre and the Opposition felt it had become impossible to run the House. The government did not pursue the matter.

Kant did not make it to Rashtrapati Bhavan in 2002 even though there was a consensus on his name between the BJP and the Opposition Congress, with Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee per-

sonally conveying to Kant that his name had been finalised. It is believed he lost out because, on several occasions, he took a stand different from what those in power wanted.

While it is not fully clear what the political ramifications of Dhankhar's exit will be, it is apparent that it is not a happy situation for the BJP: admitting they could not manage someone they had chosen for the second-highest Constitutional position. Then there are some voices from the Jat community, to which Dhankhar belongs, saying how their leaders cannot complete their terms in office. The first was Chaudhary Charan Singh, who was not allowed to prove his majority as PM in 1979, and now Dhankhar. Though his resignation may reinforce the sense of grievance among already-aggrieved Jats, it is unlikely to become a tool to mobilise the community.

The Dhankhar episode may also make members of the political class more careful of expressing their views. It is one more reminder that the era of old-school politics has come to an end. There was a time when V-Ps hosted informal lunches and there was a Central Hall in Parliament, one of those "non-institutions" of democracy that kept the dialogue going across party lines.

As for the next V-P, it is unlikely to be someone outspoken or a person who can acquire a high profile, or someone who diverges from the ruling group. It is more likely to be a person who represents a style more favoured today: rich in symbolism but low in profile.

Those misusing democratic freedoms must be held to account: PM

INDIA AND the UK reaffirmed cooperation in a number of fields, including defence, people-to-people ties, strengthening co-operation against extremist elements and repatriation of economic offenders, during Prime Minister Narendra Modi's meeting with his British counterpart Keir Starmer at Chequers, the countryside residence of the UK Prime Minister.

Addressing the media alongside Starmer, Modi raised India's concern over increasing activities of pro-Khalistani elements in the UK and said that forces with extremist ideologies must not be allowed to misuse democratic freedoms.

He said both India and the UK are "united in our view that there can be no place for double standards in the fight against terrorism" and thanked the British

government for its "strong" condemnation of the Pahalgam terror attack.

"Those who misuse democratic freedoms to undermine democracy itself must be held to account," the Prime Minister said in his media statement.

India has been flagging its concerns to the UK over the activities of pro-Khalistani elements on British soil, especially after the attack on the Indian High Commission in London in March 2023. Later, during a media briefing, Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri said the issue figured in the delegation-level talks, and that the UK has assured cooperation in this regard.

Misri also said that Modi and Starmer expressed a commitment to strengthening the global fight against terrorism.

"It was noted that extremism and radicalisation pose a threat to both societies and that there is a need to further enhance bilateral collaboration and cooperation to unlocking the

eration to deal with the scourges of terrorism, extremism and radicalisation," he said.

The Prime Ministers of India and the United Kingdom, during their meeting in London, endorsed the new "India-UK Vision 2035" that reaffirms their shared commitment to unlocking the

sustainable world in a time of rapid global change, it said.

The India-UK Vision 2035 sets clear strategic goals and milestones, tracking a path for sustained collaboration. PM Modi mentioned an education and skills partnership to deepen transnational collaborations between the UK and Indian universities, including the establishment of campuses of leading universities in each other's countries.

The two also decided to build on the Technology Security Initiative, focused on future telecoms, AI and critical minerals, laying the ground for future collaboration on semi-conductors, quantum, bio-technology and advanced materials.

Later, PM Modi called upon King Charles III at his Sandringham Estate in Norfolk, eastern England. He presented a tree sapling to the King as part of his "Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam" environmental initiative.

Modi said both also covered aspects such as Yoga and Ayurveda as well as the India-UK Free Trade Agreement signed between him and PM Starmer.

"Had a very good meeting with His Majesty King Charles III," PM Modi posted on X.

"We discussed different aspects of India-UK relations, including the ground covered in trade and investment in the wake of CETA and Vision 2035. Other subjects of discussion included education, health and wellness, particularly Yoga and Ayurveda, which are subjects His Majesty is very passionate about. We also talked about environmental protection and sustainability," he said.

The sapling he presented to the King will be planted on the estate during planting season in the autumn, Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri told reporters during a Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) briefing around the Prime Minister's visit.

Muslim clerics, Bhagwat agree on interfaith dialogue at meet

AMID GROWING discontent among Muslims against the NDA government over Waqf Amendment Act and other issues, the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) chief Mohan Bhagwat and other senior functionaries of the organisation met prominent Muslim clerics and scholars in New Delhi on Thursday. In the meeting, a host of "national issues" were discussed and the two sides stressed upon the need to start a series of dialogue between representatives of Hindu and Muslim communities to clear the "misunderstandings".

The All India Imam Organisation (AIIO) had organised the meeting titled — 'Samvaad' — at Haryana Bhawan. Along with Bhagwat, senior functionaries, including Krishna Gopal, Ramlal and Indresh Kumar, were present in the meeting.

AIIO chief Imam Umer Ahmed Ilyasi said the meeting lasted for about three-and-a-half hours and was attended by 60 prominent imams, muftis and representatives of prominent Islamic seminaries like Deoband and Nadwa.

The RSS described the discussion in the meeting as "positive" and said it was part of a continuous process of holding an extensive dialogue with all the sections of society. "The main objective is to explore how everyone can work together in the interest of the country. Today's discussion was also positive," said Sunil Ambekar, the head of the national publicity and media department of the RSS.

"A detailed discussion on national issues took place at the meeting. It was decided that there should be a dialogue between mandirs and masjids, imams and pujaris, gurukuls and madrasas so that misconceptions and confusions about each other are removed and a positive atmosphere of harmony and brotherhood is developed," Ilyasi told The Indian Express.

mony and brotherhood is developed," Ilyasi told The Indian Express.

He said it was discussed that everyone from across the castes, faiths and religions should have the sentiment of "rashtra sarpopari" (nation is supreme) and contribute in nation building.

Possible roles and responsibilities of imams and muftis in taking the nation forward were also discussed in the meeting, he said.

Asked about the RSS chief's view on the decision, he said Bhagwat appreciated the idea of continuous dialogue to clear the misunderstandings and misconceptions.

"A consensus was reached to take this forward... Similar meetings will be held in different parts of the country. The schedule will be decided soon," Ilyasi said. When asked about the "national issues" discussed in the meeting, Ilyasi refused to share details.

When asked if any "concern" was expressed by the clerics on the contentious issues like new Waqf Act and survey of mosques, Ilyasi said, "It was not a meeting about concerns but for building trust and a good atmosphere."

President's Rule for another 6 months in Manipur: Shah to move resolution in RS today

UNION HOME Minister Amit Shah will on Friday move a resolution in Rajya Sabha to extend President's Rule in Manipur for another six months.

It states: "That this House approves the continuance in force of the Proclamation dated the February 13, 2025 in respect of Manipur, issued under article 356 of the Constitution by the President, for a further period of six months with effect from August 13, 2025."

This move to extend President's Rule comes even as the state's Meitei and Naga NDA MLAs have been conducting a months-long campaign pushing for the restoration of a popular government in the state.

President's Rule had been imposed in Manipur on February 13, days after former Chief Minister N Biren Singh stepped down from the position, primarily as a result of political pressure from other BJP MLAs from the Meitei community who were dissenting against his leadership.

In the last Parliament session, Shah had said that the move to introduce President's Rule had been taken as no one had staked a claim to lead the government after Singh's resignation. However, since April, NDA MLAs — including Singh, legislators close to him, as well as those who dissented against him — have been pushing for the restoration of a "popular" gov-

ernment, citing the lack of support for President's Rule and the perception that there has not been enough movement towards the restoration of normalcy in the state.

The move to extend President's Rule in the state is likely to cause further discontent among the Meitei and Naga MLAs.

There have been months of relative peace in the foothill areas where the Meitei-majority Valley meets the Kuki-Zo majority hills, which had been among the worst-affected parts of Manipur in the ongoing conflict. The last major cycle of violence between the communities had taken place in November last year.

In the past month, there have been three significant weapons recoveries by security forces in the state, and the government has expressed its intent to facilitate the return to their homes of a large section of people displaced by the violence by the end of the year. However, more than 26 months since the start of the conflict, there has been no significant headway on dialogue between stakeholders of the Meitei and the Kuki-Zo communities.

Congress 'fell short' of understanding OBC issues, opened up space for BJP, says Rahul

LOKSABHA Leader of Opposition Rahul Gandhi on Thursday said the Congress party "fell short" of understanding and addressing the issues faced by the OBCs and that "opened up the space" for the BJP. Speaking at an event attended by Congress's Lok Sabha MPs and Telangana leadership at Indira Bhavan, Gandhi said the party must be responsive to all communities moving forward to send a message of fairness.

"I would like to say one thing. It is a personal thing. People may not agree with me. When it came to Dalit, Adivasi, women's issues, the Congress was on track. And I am talking about the last 10-15 years. But I do feel that when it came to OBCs, the Congress party's understanding of their issues, the challenges they were

facing and the type of actions that the party should have and could have taken, we fell short."

"Maybe many will say, no, you are wrong. But this is a feeling I have that we allowed, we opened the space for the BJP because we were not responsive to the aspirations, to the desires of the OBCs," he said.

Telangana Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy, who was also present at the event, gave a presentation on the state's socio, economic, educational, employment, political and caste survey 2024.

Gandhi said when he started pushing for the caste census in Telangana, in the back of his mind there was an issue. "That we have Revanth Reddy as Chief

Minister and that it will be difficult for him to push the caste census because his community may not appreciate that action."

The LoP described the Telangana caste survey as a "milestone for social justice in the country, whether the BJP likes it or not" and said the national caste census will have to follow the Telangana caste survey.

The Congress has demanded that the Centre should adopt the "Telangana model" of caste enumeration as part of the next Census. Gandhi said the Congress high command will push the Telangana model of caste census in Parliament. Gandhi also spoke about the importance of English education. "The single biggest determinant of success of progressive India is English education. That is surprising... English education is much more powerful in India than education in a regional language or Hindi. I am not say-

ing Hindi is not important or regional languages are not important. They are. But what is determining progress is English... This is a historical fact," said Gandhi.

The Congress leader's statement comes a month after Union Home Minister Amit Shah said at an event that soon a time would come when those speaking English in this country would "feel ashamed". Shah said those who do not speak Indian languages cease to remain fully Indian and that India cannot be understood through "foreign languages".

Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge said, "Our society needs three things — economic strength, human strength, and mental strength... A society that has these three things progresses..." said Kharge. The Congress chief urged the PCC presidents and other leaders to take the Telangana caste survey to other states.

BIHAR ELECTORAL ROLL REVISION DRIVE

RJD says 'can consider boycott', Congress adds 'all options' open

A DAY after RJD leader Tejashwi Yadav said his party could "consider boycotting" the coming Assembly polls in Bihar over the last-minute Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls being held in the state, the Congress said "every option" is open.

Krishna Allavaru, the Congress in-charge for Bihar, made the remarks at a press interaction at the All India Congress Committee (AICC) headquarters in Delhi.

"From day one, the INDIA bloc's stand has been very clear. This process (of SIR) is a theft of elections. And the Opposition is standing with the people in every possible way. Talks on every option are ongoing. One thing is clear — through this process, the votes of the people of Bihar are being snatched away... Elections are being stolen from them and this is not just about Bihar... This is about the country and clearly all av-

enues are open... Everything is being discussed. When a decision is taken, you will be informed," said Allavaru.

On Wednesday, in response to a question outside the Assembly on whether the Opposition could boycott the polls, Tejashwi said, "We can discuss this. We will discuss this with allies and people. If such is the situation when (it is decided) who gets how many seats, there is no need to hold elections."

Allavaru said he challenged Chief Election Commissioner Gyanesh Kumar "to pick a thousand random people in every constituency in Bihar and scrutinise if the laid-down processes (on SIR revision) are being followed or not". "Even if 25% turns out to be genuine, then we will accept this procedure. The truth is this voter list is of the BJP and Gyanesh Kumar. We do not accept it."

Lok Sabha Leader of the

Opposition Rahul Gandhi repeated his claim Thursday that the Congress has "concrete 100% proof" of "cheating" in a constituency in Karnataka during the general elections last year. He warned the poll panel that it will not get away with this, "because we are going to come for you".

"We just looked at one constituency and we found this. I am absolutely convinced that, constituency after constituency, this is the drama that is taking place. Thousands and thousands of new voters — 45, 50, 60, 65, thousands and thousands of them in one constituency — voter deletion, voter addition, new voters who are way above 18 (is going on)... We have caught them," Gandhi said.

The EC responded strongly to Gandhi's allegations. "As far as the Karnataka elections are concerned, it is highly unfortunate that rather than filing election petition as per Section 80 of the Representation of the People Act — or if filed, awaiting the verdict of Hon'ble HC — he (Gandhi) has made baseless allegations and chosen to threaten the ECI, which is a Constitutional body," it said.

Assembly protest: FIR filed against Prashant Kishor, 2,000 supporters

Patna: Jan Suraj Party founder Prashant Kishor, eight other leaders of the outfit and 2,000 unidentified supporters have been booked for assault, rioting and violating curfew orders amid a protest march in Patna Wednesday.

Apart from Kishor, the FIR at Patna's Secretariat Police Station names Jan Suraj's state president Manoj Bharti, spokesperson Vivek Kumar, N.P. Mandal, Kishor Kumar, Arvind Singh, Lalan Yadav, Jitendra Yadav, and YouTuber-politician Manish Kashyap.

According to the FIR, authorities received information regarding Jan Suraj's plan to gherao the Vidhan Sabha the day before the June 23 protest and barricaded all routes to the Assembly. Jan Suraj had decided to gherao the Assembly over three demands — disbursing ₹ 2 lakh to poor families, allocation of three decimals of land to landless Dalit families, and action against alleged corruption in land surveys.

JD(U) MP who spoke against SIR gets show-cause notice

THE JD(U) has issued a show-cause notice to its MP Giridhari Yadav, who had on Wednesday called the Special Intensive Revision of electoral rolls in Bihar a "Tughlaqi farman" (ill-conceived diktat).

Yadav, the Banka MP from JD(U), Bihar's ruling party and a BJP ally, had said outside the Parliament, "Election Commission has no practical knowledge. It neither knows the history nor the geography of Bihar; it knows nothing."

"It took 10 days for me to arrange all the documents," the parliamentarian said, adding that his son lives in America.

to submit documents establishing their eligibility.

As on Thursday, the EC said the forms of 7.21 crore electors (91.32%) had been received and digitised. The EC said 21.6 lakh electors were reported by the Booth Level Officers (BLOs) and Booth Level Agents (BLAs) of political parties as dead, 31.5 lakh permanently migrated and 7 lakh registered at more than one place.

"Despite door-to-door visits by local BLOs/BLAs, forms of fewer than 7 lakh electors have still not been received. As per the SIR order, the draft electoral roll will be published on August 1, 2025, and printed as well as digital copies will be provided to all 12 political parties [national and state parties in Bihar]..." the EC said in a statement.

THE ELECTION Commission Thursday said "99%" of the 7.89 crore registered electors of Bihar had been "covered" during the ongoing Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of the electoral rolls and less than 7 lakh forms were yet to be received, with one day to go for the deadline to submit forms.

According to the EC's June 24 order, all existing electors were required to submit enumeration forms by Friday, July 25, in order to remain on the draft electoral roll to be published on August 1. All those who were added to the rolls after January 1, 2003, when the EC says the last intensive revision was done, were additionally required

AT LOSS OF WORDS

AMID THE ongoing Hindi-Marathi row, senior BJP MP Nishikant Dubey had to face the ire of angry Maharashtra women MPs outside the Lok Sabha on Wednesday. The women MPs, led by Congress's Varsha Gaikwad, surrounded Dubey as he was coming out of the Lower House and shouted at him: "You are against Maharashtra? Who are you planning to thrash?" Dubey walked away calmly but the group followed him to the MPs' canteen. Varsha again shouted at the BJP MP as he came out of the canteen. A visibly embarrassed Dubey was seen trying to pacify the Congress leader saying "it's not like that..." The Maharashtra MPs were angry about Dubey's reported remark that "those who beat up Hindi speakers would be thrashed by the public wherever they go".

At UNSC, India seeks immediate ceasefire, aid to end Gaza crisis

VOICING STRONG concern over the current situation in Gaza, India has called for an immediate ceasefire, uninterrupted humanitarian aid into Gaza and release of Israeli hostages by Hamas to address the deepening humanitarian crisis in the Palestinian territory.

Speaking at the UN Security Council, India's Permanent Representative to the UN, Ambassador Parvathaneni Harish said that mere pauses in hostilities are not enough.

"Intermittent pauses in hostilities are not enough to address the scale of humanitarian challenges confronting the people, who grapple daily with acute shortages of food and fuel, inadequate medical services and lack of access to education," Harish said.

Last month, India had abstained from voting during the resolution at the UNGA for a ceasefire in Gaza. On June 13, the UNGA had backed a resolution

demanding an immediate, unconditional and permanent ceasefire in Gaza, the release of all hostages and resumption of humanitarian aid to stave off famine. As many as 149 countries voted in favour, India was one of the 19 countries that abstained. However, on Thursday, at the open debate on the 'Situation in the Middle East, including the Palestinian question', Harish underlined India's consistent position in this regard.

"Humanitarian assistance needs to be facilitated in a safe, sustained and timely manner. There is no substitute to peace. A ceasefire must be put in place. All hostages must be released. Dialogue and diplomacy remain the only viable paths to achieving these objectives. There are no other fixes or solutions," he said.

He also expressed hope that an upcoming UN conference on the Israel-Palestine conflict would pave the way for "concrete steps" towards achieving a two-State solution, which India has always advocated.

After 23 yrs, Shah’s ministry resets cooperative vision

WHEN UNION Home Minister Amit Shah unveiled a new national cooperative policy Thursday, replacing one in place for the past 23 years, it marked another milestone for the department whose role has been expanding under the Narendra Modi government.

As per the statement issued by the Cooperation Ministry, the new policy is part of the Centre’s aim to strengthen cooperatives in the country, and “will prove to be a milestone in the cooperative movement of India for the next two decades from 2025-45”.

The ministry said a new policy was needed because of globalisation and technological advancements in the past two decades. The Ministry of Cooperation was formed as a separate ministry by the Modi government four years ago, with Shah given the charge of it. From 1979 till then, the cooperatives department fell under the Agriculture Ministry.

The new ministry, Sahkarita Mantralaya, was announced via a two-page notification in the official gazette, a day before Modi effected the biggest reshuffle of his second term, on July 7, 2021. Its vision was stated to be ‘Sahakar se Samridhhi (Prosperity through Cooperation)’.

MNS workers beat up man at bus stand for not speaking in Marathi

A TOILET attendant at the Nanded state transport bus stand was allegedly assaulted by Maharashtra Navnirman Sena (MNS) workers on Wednesday after he reportedly refused to speak Marathi. The attendant was a Hindi-speaking person.

While videos of the alleged incident, and the man issuing an apology later, have surfaced on social media, no FIR was registered in the matter until Wednesday evening.

In one of the purported videos, the man working as an attendant outside the ladies’ toilet at the bus stand is confronted by a local who questions why he was collecting Rs 5 from women for using the facilities — a service that is typically free. The man is heard asking the attendant to respond in Marathi. The attendant, however, purportedly refuses to do so, saying, “I will not speak Marathi, do what you want to do.”

In another purported video, several men wearing MNS scarves can be seen slapping and punching the attendant, demanding he apologise for not speaking in Marathi. They are also heard accusing him of misbehaving with women and speaking rudely and arrogantly.

Govt will not tolerate violence in the name of language dispute, says CM Fadnavis

New Delhi, Mumbai, Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis on Thursday said violence in the name of language dispute will not be tolerated and dealt firmly. Speaking in Marathi at the JNU in Delhi, Fadnavis said, “There is no dispute between Hindi and Marathi. While one should be proud of Marathi, which is not only the mother tongue of Marathi people but also a classical language, one cannot ignore other Indian languages.”

The CM laid the foundation stone for the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Special Centre for Security and Strategic Studies, planned under the School of International Studies.

Meanwhile, Deputy CM Ajit Pawar called for greater respect for the state’s language and culture, particularly from those who have migrated from other parts of India. Pawar emphasised that every state has its own linguistic identity. “In every state, the language of that particular region is important and should be respected and given priority,” he said. **ENS**

The notification laid out the wide jurisdiction of the new Cooperation Ministry: Framing policy to coordinating cooperation activities across sectors; strengthening the cooperative movement and deepening its reach; promoting a “cooperative-based economic development model”; winding up of cooperative societies with objects not confined to one state; and training of personnel of cooperative departments and institutions.

Addressing an event to mark four years of the Cooperation Ministry at Anand in Gujarat on July 6, Shah said that PM Modi had “breathed new life” into more than 8.4 lakh cooperative societies, connecting about 31 crore people.

The growth

The government’s emphasis on cooperatives, also reflected in the choice of Shah to lead it, is understandable from the perspective of the sector’s significant contribution to the economy, and as a source of employment for millions of people.

In the last four years, the ministry has seen several big initiatives, including the Multi-State Cooperative Societies Act, 2023, that ushered in three new cooperative bodies, including National Cooperative Exports Limited (NCEL), with plans for “the world’s largest grain storage”.

PMLA CASE AGAINST ROBERT VADRA

Land deal cancellation was illegally revoked by ex-Haryana CM Hooda: ED to Court

HARYANA’S FORMER Chief Minister and Congress leader Bhupinder Singh Hooda “illegally” revoked the cancellation of a land deal in Shikohpur, Gurugram, which was carried out in 2008 in favour of Robert Vadra, alleged the Enforcement Directorate before a Delhi court on Thursday.

“The mutation was cancelled by the then Director General of Land Consolidation and Land records-cum-Inspector-General of Registration of Haryana (IAS Ashok Khemka)... the cancellation was revoked illegally by Haryana’s CM,” said ED’s Special Counsel Zoheb Hossain before the court of Special Judge Sushant Changotra.

The deal being mentioned here was the purchase of 3.5 acres of land in Shikohpur from Onkareshwar Properties for ₹7.5 crore in 2008 and selling the land to DLF four years later for ₹58 crore by a company named Skylight Hospitality, whose director was Vadra.

“There were irregularities such as false declarations. This company had no capacity to pay. It had only ₹1 lakh in its capital... the actual payment was made later leading to evasion of stamp duty,” Hossain, who was accompanied by ED’s Special Public Prosecutor NK Matta, argued.

The ED was arguing on its chargesheet, which was filed last Thursday against Vadra and 10 others (eight companies and two

scheme” and two lakh new Multi-Purpose Primary Agricultural Credit Societies.

Earlier this month, Shah laid the foundation stone of India’s first national cooperative university, and advocated that cooperative education be included in the secondary school curricula.

In a statement on September 8, 2022, the Cooperation Ministry said: “The cooperative sector gives 20% of the total agricultural credit of the country, 35% of the fertilizer distribution is done by the cooperative sector, 25% of fertilizer production, 31% of sugar production, more

than 10% of milk production is done through cooperatives, more than 13% procurement of wheat and more than 20% of the procurement of paddy is done by the cooperative sector, and more than 21% of the fishermen’s business is done by cooperative societies.”

The formation of the NCEL has also opened up the export sector for cooperatives. Within months of its establishment, the NCEL received orders of rice and wheat from several countries, amounting to a total of Rs 5,000 crore.

With Primary Agriculture Cooperative Societies allowed to

diversify, their business activities now cover more than 25 fields, including dairy, fishery, floriculture, setting up of godowns, procurement of foodgrains, fertilizers, seeds, LPG/CNG/petrol/diesel distributorship, short-term and long-term credit, fair price shops, and Common Service Centres which help people access government benefits.

Former Kerala-cadre IAS officer Devendra Kumar Singh, who served as the first Secretary of the Cooperation Ministry in 2021-22, and is now the chairperson of the Cooperative Election Authority says it has helped bring transparency into the system – “in conduct of elections, increasing accountability of elected members to reforms and signing bye-laws of societies with the Act and Rules”.

The evolution

The history of the cooperative sector dates back to before Independence, with a Cooperative Credit Societies Act enacted in 1904. Within a few years, there was an exponential expansion in the sector, with the number of societies registered under it increasing to 5,300 and their membership to over 3 lakh by 1911.

On December 14, 1946, eight months before the country got Independence, the Khera District Cooperative Milk Producers Milk Union, or Amul, was registered.

RENUKASWAMY MURDER CASE

SC reserves order on plea against actor Darshan’s bail

THE SUPREME COURT Thursday reserved its decision on an appeal by the Karnataka Government to cancel the bail granted to actor Darshan Thoogudeepa in the Renukaswamy murder case, even as it reiterated its displeasure over the approach of the high court, which granted him the relief.

Darshan was arrested on June 11, 2024, for his alleged role in the June 9 murder of a fan, Renukaswamy, who allegedly stalked and abused his close friend and actor Pavitra Gowda on social media. The members of his gang and Gowda were arrested after investigations revealed that the actor allegedly paid a few men for the murder in Bengaluru.

On December 13, 2024, the Karnataka HC granted regular bail to him, Gowda, co-accused Pradoosh Rao, Jagadish alias Jaggu, Anu Kumar, Lakshman M, and Nagaraju K.

‘A matter of concern’

A bench of Justices J B Pardiwala and R Mahadevan wondered if the high court would have a similar approach in all bail pleas before it. Justice Pardiwala asked Senior Advocate Siddharth Dave, who appeared for Darshan, “In a lighter vein, don’t you think the High Court has basically dictated an order of acquittal of all 7 (of the 17 accused names in the chargesheet)?”

“There are ways and ways of assigning reasons. The manner in which the high court has dictated the order, very sorry to say, but does the high court dictate the same type of orders in all bail applications? What is troubling us is the approach of the high court!... That is the understanding of the learned judge? And that too from the high court? We can understand a session judge committing such mistakes. A high

court judge committing such a mistake!” the judge added. Though Dave tried to defend the HC order, saying the findings are only preliminary, Justice Pardiwala said, “It is a question of perverse prima facie exercise of discretion. We are trying to examine, while exercising discretion, whether the high court has applied its mind judiciously. That’s a matter of concern. We will not commit the same mistake as the high court did. We will not give any judgment for conviction or acquittal.”

Eyewitness statement

Appearing for the state, Senior Advocate Siddharth Luthra narrated the sequence of events and the nature of evidence against the accused actor. Luthra added that while Darshan was in jail, two more cases were registered against him, and after coming out on bail, he was seen in the company of prosecution witnesses. The court referred to the two eyewitnesses in the case and asked if their statements were corroborated.

Luthra said the prosecution had recovered photos of the actor with other accused from the phone of an eyewitness.

The court asked when the photograph was taken, to which Luthra said it was taken immediately after the assault. “So after the assault, the person clicks a photo with the actor?” asked Justice Pardiwala, adding it’s “unbelievable.” Luthra attributed it to a kind of cult worship for actors.

ronment is reduced to a bare minimum. We therefore direct that instead of 5 feet, idols up to 6 feet shall necessarily be immersed in artificial water bodies,” the bench said in the order.

New arrangements, logistical issues

After being informed that, according to the CPCB’s expert committee, its guidelines were “always advisory in nature,” the Bombay High Court on June 9 lifted the ban on the manufacture and sale of idols made of PoP. However, the court stated that the idols would not be immersed in natural bodies without obtaining permission from

the HC and sought the state’s policy on immersion. On Wednesday, after perusing the state’s guidelines, the court asked the state government and the BMC if it was possible to create artificial tanks for immersion of PoP idols up to 7 or 8 feet in height.

On Thursday, senior advocate Milind Sathe, while representing BMC, informed the court that while 85,306 Ganesh idols of less than 5 feet were immersed in artificial tanks in the city last year, with the new state mandate, suitable arrangements for immersing all 1,95,306 (110 lakh in addition) such idols in artificial ponds will have to be made this year.

Unpacking National Sports Governance Bill, now in LS

An eminent sports lawyer explains the significance and key aspects of the proposed legislation and flags some areas of caution to **Mihir Vasavda**

THE NATIONAL Sports Governance Bill introduced by Sports Minister Mansukh Mandaviya in Lok Sabha on Wednesday proposes two major changes in the way sport is governed in the country.

One, formation of a National Sports Board with sweeping powers to lay down rules and oversee the functioning of federations, including the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI).

Two, setting up a National Sports Tribunal with powers of a civil court to decide a range of disputes from selections of athletes to federation elections. Appeals against Tribunal decisions shall lie to the Supreme Court.

Why was a Bill like this needed?

The need for a sports regulator was mentioned by the Draft Comprehensive

National Sports Policy 2007. The National Sports Board has proposed a SEBI-type body to establish a unified national structure for sport. (The Securities and Exchange Board of India is the statutory regulatory body for the securities market.)

Many of the provisions and structures in the Bill owe their origin to the National Sports Development Bills that were drafted, but not passed, in the early part of the last decade. You can draw a straight line from these to significant portions of the Bill.

With a National Sports Board, the regulatory capacity of the government in sports will increase. The institution will have a budget and can hire specialised staff with legal and auditing expertise, for instance, to evaluate how the 56 National Sports Federations and their affiliates are being run.

In the absence of legislation, the Sports Code of 2011 has been the administrative instrument to establish standards for the government's recognition of National Sports Federations. In the absence of statutory backing and regulatory institutions, this was always going to be a stopgap measure, and the history of its implementation has been chequered.

This regulatory failure led to extensive judicial intervention in the affairs of sports bodies, especially with many federations being obviously run quite poorly. However, many court cases have remained unresolved for years; in some cases, courts have themselves walked back judgments.

Numerous federations are being run by *ad hoc* bodies, and almost every federation election is now challenged in court. This is not sustainable.

The end goal of judicial intervention is public interest. While cleaning the [Augean] stables is a means, the desired end must always be healthier sports institutions.

We are presuming that the Tribunal will stay independent and free of conflicts.

Indeed, many will say 'oh, not one more tribunal!' when many of our tribunals have not been successful. But while this will be a first for sport in India, standalone dispute resolution chambers and tribunals is the model followed in sport globally.

Having time-bound procedures and sports-aware people in dispute resolution is preferable to keep sport healthy and moving forward.

Of course, any tribunal will need well-qualified, independent-minded members.

Is there a similar concern for the National Sports Board?

The powers proposed to be vested in the Board have always been there with the Sports Ministry. Having the Board as a statutory public institution with a defined role and obligations will increase public scrutiny and transparency on how these powers are exercised.

The other type of public transparency comes through information about sports bodies. It is currently not easy to identify the appropriate district sports federation for a particular sport. For someone who wants to play the sport competitively, or someone who would like to hold an event or sponsor or partner, it is often difficult to determine which body to deal with.

The Bill proposes that the Board will register all affiliated units of the NSFs. This step of 'governance through information' by the Board can lead to 'governance through standard-setting' — like SEBI does with listing standards — and 'governance through frame-

work alignment' whereby the system comes together to work in unison.

Why has the age limit for administrators been raised to 75, and tenures done away with?

It has been argued that various concessions are needed to enable more Indian administrators to be on international sports bodies, in leadership positions. It has been suggested that it takes time and experience to understand the administration locally, and to then establish oneself internationally.

Such perceived benefits must be balanced with the obvious risks of entrenchment and institutional capture. It is important to tread carefully.

The BCCI has so far not been under the government. How does that change?

I don't know the government's formal position on this, but it has been reported that the intention is for the BCCI to also come under the ambit of the law, even though it has never been recognised as an NSF thus far.

A material change will be with regard to existing age and tenure clauses. The BCCI constitution allows a maximum of three. Join FREE Telegram Channel chat.whatsapp.com/HDVqPnxvwWb3Agy98nVaQ

terms of three years each in the BCCI or a state association after which an office bearer cannot be elected again.

Another question is whether the BCCI becomes an Indian Olympic Association (IOA) member given the inclusion of the sport in the forthcoming Olympics.

Does the Bill take away the right of athletes to go to court for redressal of their grievances?

According to the Bill, the first port of call for disputes is the internal dispute resolution chamber, followed by the Tribunal in appeal. This is in line with international sports dispute resolution structures. For instance, in the FIFA system, all participants from players to clubs are barred from approaching the ordinary courts in any country. You have to use the FIFA or member association dispute-resolution chambers, and appeals lie only to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS).

A mature sports dispute-resolution process is deliberately intended to be kept separate from the court structure. Keeping dispute resolution accessible, financially viable and fair to athletes will be a critical aspect of good governance.

WHY A STRONG ROUBLE IS A DOUBLE-EDGED SWORD FOR RUSSIA

THE RUSSIAN rouble's 45% rise against the US dollar since the start of the year has made it one of the world's best performing currencies — but the sharp appreciation is proving to be a double-edged sword for the heavily sanctioned Russian economy. Here's why.

Why has the rouble risen so much against the dollar?

The rise is driven primarily by the Russian central bank's tight monetary policy and optimism after US-Russia talks in February raised hopes for a peace settlement in Ukraine.

Interest rates on rouble deposits have also soared above 20%, making the currency attractive to savers and as a speculative trade for its yield. At the same time, high borrowing costs have slowed imports, reducing demand for foreign currency.

The weakness of the US currency, whose index lost 6.6% since President Donald Trump's "Liberation Day" tariff announcement on April 2, has also helped the rouble.

Although the central bank says there is a freely floating exchange rate, it has been selling the Chinese yuan, its only major intervention tool, to support the rouble. When the rouble strengthens against the yuan, its rate against the dollar strengthens as well to avoid arbitrage.

Why is a strong rouble a 'double-edged' sword?

The strength of the rouble means that dollar-denominated energy revenues generate fewer roubles for the Russian budget. A weaker rouble would boost budget revenues. The 2025 budget assumes an average rate of 94.3 roubles per dollar, but the current rate is around 78. If the rouble stays strong, analysts estimate the budget could lose 2.4% of its revenues this year.

Russian businesses also argue a strong rouble is making exports more expensive to buyers in dollars and other currencies. Exporters, from oil to metals to agriculture, are hurting. A stronger rouble makes their revenues shrink. Many officials and business leaders say they would prefer a rate of 100 to the dollar.

However, Elvira Nabiullina, the governor of the central bank, argues that a

softer currency would be a sign of economic vulnerability.

Nabiullina, who on Friday announces the latest interest rate decision, says the exchange rate is not just there to please exporters, stressing that the strong rouble is a product of the tight monetary policy needed to fight stubbornly high inflation.

What lies ahead?

Analysts have warned for months that the rouble is overvalued, but the currency has defied their forecasts so far. The central bank is widely expected to cut interest rates at its upcoming meeting. If it does, market rates will fall as well, prompting savers to pull money from rouble deposits. That could weaken the currency.

A bigger test looms in early September, when a 50-day deadline set by US President Donald Trump for Russia to show progress toward peace in Ukraine expires. If new US sanctions targeting buyers of Russian oil follow, the rouble could come under renewed pressure.

The last time the rouble weakened significantly was in November 2024, after Washington sanctioned Gazprombank, which had handled oil and gas payments.

A source close to the central bank pointed to Reuters that when the regulator cut the key rate from 17% to 11% between February and July 2015, the rouble took several months to weaken gradually. This is the regulator's expectation this time.

THE INTERNATIONAL Court of Justice (ICJ) delivered a landmark ruling on Wednesday that can breathe new life into the climate movement, and potentially open the floodgates for litigation seeking greater accountability from countries on climate action.

The Hague-based court, which is the main judicial branch of the United Nations, has held that countries are under a legal obligation to take steps to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and could be held liable to pay compensation if they failed to do so.

The ruling has come in the form of an advisory opinion of the court, and does not on its own impact any country immediately. It can nonetheless have significant implications for the global fight against climate change.

By making it clear that climate action is not just a policy imperative for countries but a legally-binding commitment under international law, the ruling strengthens the position of developing countries and everyone else advocating enhanced climate action from the rich and industrialised world.

The ruling was delivered in a case resulting from a resolution passed by the UN General Assembly in March 2022, seeking the advisory opinion of the court on climate change.

The UNGA wanted the ICJ to address two very specific questions: (i) what are the obligations of countries under international law to protect the climate system and, (ii) what are the legal consequences for countries that do not fulfil their obligations.

Ruling of the court

The court examined the provisions of the three climate treaties — the 1994 UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), the 1997 Kyoto Protocol, and the 2015 Paris Agreement — and several other environment-related international laws that have a bearing on the climate system.

These include the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS), the 1987 Montreal Protocol for protecting ozone, the 1992 Convention on Biodiversity and the 1994 Convention to Combat Desertification.

The court concluded that climate action was not a matter of choice or preference, but a legal obligation: countries were obligated to take measures that contributed to the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions. In addition, rich and industrialised countries in Annexure I of the UNFCCC had an obligation to take the lead on emissions reduction, and facilitate technology and financial transfers to developing countries.

It identified several other obligations of countries, and said that failure to fulfil them would constitute "an internationally wrongful act" which could have legal consequences. These could include being held liable to provide full reparation to countries that suffer on account of climate disasters, or other impacts of climate change. Countries could be held liable even for the irresponsible actions of private businesses or corporations, if they had failed to exercise due diligence and not taken adequate regulatory or legislative measures to prevent the irresponsible behaviour of private actors, the court held.

Significance of ruling

The advisory opinion of the ICJ is not international law, and it is not binding on countries. However, it is the most authoritative interpretation of international law on the subject, and it is likely to be relied upon by

courts around the world in deciding matters that come before them.

This ruling is expected to put the spotlight back on climate change. In recent years, progress on the global fight against climate change has been severely undermined by the lack of adequate action by countries, particularly those in the developed world. The emissions reduction targets for 2030 will almost certainly be missed.

The withdrawal of the US, the world's biggest historical emitter and a major laggard nation on climate action, from the Paris Agreement has put a question mark on the future of cooperative global action on climate. The credibility of international climate negotiations is at stake, with developing countries, particularly the most vulnerable ones, very upset over their concerns being ignored.

The ICJ's advisory opinion does not directly set right any of these. Several parts of the ruling could be difficult or impractical to implement, and these are likely to be hotly contested in courts. What the opinion has done though, is to reaffirm the legal sanctity of the provisions and principles mentioned in international laws on climate change, and declared that non-adherence to these could be reason to impose penalties on countries.

This is important because the climate actions mandated under the UNFCCC or the

Paris Agreement are, barring a few, largely suggestive in nature, and there are no consequences for countries for non-compliance.

For example, the US suffered no consequences for pulling out of the Paris Agreement, and the developed countries as a whole got away with not meeting their finance obligations. Most developed countries did not meet their emissions reduction targets under the Kyoto Protocol either, and some of them walked out of the treaty again without any consequences.

The ICJ has not spelt out the consequences for any of these countries. That will be for other courts to decide, if any such matter comes before them.

The ICJ's opinion that countries that suffer from climate impacts — it calls them "injured states" — are entitled not just to compensation, but full reparation, is a major development. Developed nations reluctantly acknowledge that small and vulnerable countries require assistance, financial and otherwise, to deal with climate disasters, but reject any suggestion of liability, compensation, or reparations.

With this, the ICJ has strongly endorsed the concept of loss and damage in climate laws, which call upon developed countries to take the lead in raising financial and other support to help countries recover from impacts of climate change. This is likely to trigger a wave of litigation seeking compensation from the developed countries. Corporate polluters too are likely to be taken to court.

The advisory opinion is likely to be contested — and not just by the developed world.

For example, the ICJ has opined that merely initiating some climate actions is not sufficient compliance with the obligations of countries—the scale or magnitude of these actions is open to scrutiny. However, under the Paris Agreement, countries are free to decide their climate actions, and the only requirement is that every subsequent set of actions must be a progression on the previous ones. There is no provision to ascertain the sufficiency of a country's climate action, or the lack thereof.

The actual impact of the ruling will become evident only when it begins to be cited as precedent in individual cases on climate-related disputes, and from the treatment that it receives from governments.

India-UK FTA promises a cheaper peg: the story and history of Scotch whisky

INDIA AND the UK signed a landmark Free Trade Agreement (FTA) on Thursday which will, among other things, bring down tariffs on Scotch whisky from 150% to 75% immediately, and to 40% over the next 10 years.

India is a "priority growth market" for the industry, according to trade group Scotch Whisky Association. What is Scotch, and what is its history?

Alchemical origins

The word "whisky" comes from the Gaelic *uisge beatha* or *usquebaugh* which derive from the Medieval Latin *aqua vitae*, meaning "water of life". While the Scots and the Irish disagree on the geographical provenance of whisky, its alchemical origins are beyond dispute.

In the *Consideration of the Fifth Essence of All Things*, the 14th century alchemist

John of Rupescissa recorded the preservative properties of the distillate of wine, which he called *aqua vitae*. "John...notes how meat left in the open air quickly begins to rot, but when immersed in alcohol it is preserved indefinitely..." Johns Hopkins University professor Lawrence M Principe wrote in *The Secrets of Alchemy* (2012).

In the 15th century, *aqua vitae* "might be drunk by royalty and the nobility but it was not yet by any means the drink of the people", Michael Brander wrote in *The Original Scotch: A History of Scotch Whisky from the Earliest Days* (1975).

Whisky becomes whisky

As techniques of distillation improved and became widespread in Scotland during the 16th century, the production of *aqua vitae* grew, and so did its reputation of having medicinal properties. Raphael Holinshed's 1578 text *Chronicles of England, Scotland and Ireland* said: "Beying moderatly taken, it sloweth age; it strengtheneth youthe; it helpeth digestion... it abandoneth melancholie; it relisheth the harte; it lighteneth the mynde; it quickeneth the spirites... trulie it is a soueraigne liquor" (quoted by Brander).

A FEW WHISKY WORDS

SCOTCH WHISKY is defined as "a spirit distilled in Scotland from water and malted barley (to which only whole grains of other cereals may be added), fermented by the action of yeast and matured for at least three years in oak casks in Scotland", by the Scotch Whisky Regulations, 2009.

THE AGE statement on a bottle of Scotch refers to the youngest whisky in the blend or batch. A bottle with no age statement has been matured for three years.

By the 17th century, the term *uisge beatha*

was being used to refer to a spirit distilled from barley, the forerunner of whisky as we know today. "Crude though it may have been, often mixed with cinnamon and herbs, or sometimes with honey and oatmeal, to make

it palatable, the modern whisky was slowly developing," Brander wrote.

Highland, Lowland whiskies

In 1644, the Scots Parliament introduced a duty "on everie pynt of aquavytie or strong watteris sold within the country" indicating that the spirit must have become fairly commonplace in Scotland by then. Such regulations would also shape how whisky developed differently in the different geographical regions of Scotland.

In the northern Highlands, where enforcement of duties was lax, an illicit whisky economy thrived. The whisky here remained truer to its origins — malted barley, often peated, was the grain of choice, which gave Highland whiskies their distinctive bold and smoky flavours.

Lowland distillers, on the other hand, had no option but to pay the duties. This led to them experimenting with grains other than barley, since by the 18th century, duties primarily targeted the raw material rather than the finished product. Unlike Highland "sin-

gle malts", Lowland whiskies often comprise a mix of grains including wheat and corn.

Nineteenth century boom

Three factors cemented Scotch whisky's worldwide popularity in the 19th century.

First was the development of the column still in the 1830s, which allowed for the manufacture of far greater quantities of whisky at a time than the old pot still. While high-end distillers still use pot stills, the column still paved the way for commercial production.

Second was the shortage of wine and brandy around the 1870s-1880s, primarily due to the scourge of *phylloxera*, a parasitic insect, that ravaged vineyards across France. "The English who had hitherto relied on brandy as their after-dinner drink were ready for a substitute..." Brander wrote.

Third was colonialism, which took it to countries around the globe — including India — where native elites took to the drink, often to ape the colonial masters.

India-UK trade pact could serve as a template as Delhi presses ahead with agreements with others, including US and EU

ON THURSDAY, INDIA and the UK signed the Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement that has been many years in the making. Leaders of both countries exuded confidence that the agreement would open up markets and bring enormous benefits to their countries. The goal is to double bilateral trade between the nations from roughly \$56 billion now. The signing of the deal was accompanied by the unveiling of the UK-India Vision 2035 — which envisages greater engagement in areas such as defence, tech and education, indicating a desire to deepen the relationship between the two countries.

Through this trade agreement, said to be one of the most comprehensive deals that Delhi has entered into, India has indicated its willingness to bring down its tariffs substantially as it seeks to integrate more closely with developed countries and encourage more investment into the country. Delhi's high tariff walls have been criticised by others, including the US. The Office of the United States Trade Representative had recently noted that India's average applied tariff rate was 17 per cent, while that on agricultural products was even higher at 39 per cent. As per reports, under this new deal, the average tariffs on British products will fall from 15 per cent to 3 per cent, which could potentially lead to a large increase in UK exports. On the other hand, the agreement paves the way for "unprecedented duty free access for 99 per cent of India's exports to the UK", covering almost the entire trade basket. This includes labour intensive segments such as textiles, leather, footwear and gems and jewellery, as well as sectors like engineering goods and auto components. Alongside, India has secured significant commitments on services and labour mobility. The agreement increases market access in critical areas such as IT and IT-enabled services as well as financial, legal, professional and educational services. The double contribution convention agreement will help Indian professionals and their employers avoid making social security payments in the UK, thereby bringing down the costs of doing business.

The India-UK deal comes at a time when the global trading architecture has been upended by US President Donald Trump's tariff policies. Trump has over the past few days announced new deals with countries such as Japan, the Philippines and Indonesia, after similar agreements with Britain and Vietnam, with the tariffs ranging between 10 and 20 per cent. In the case of India, even as talks continue, a deal remains elusive. India is also negotiating a deal with the EU — as this paper has reported, the two sides have agreed to seven out of 23 chapters in the agreement. The deal with the UK could serve as a template for some of the issues, especially the more contentious ones. STARVING GAZA

If Israel continues its starvation policy with impunity, it will be a severe blow to rules-based global order, its legitimacy

ACCORDING TO GAZA'S Health Ministry, out of more than 55,000 people killed since the war began in October 2023, at least 111 — most of them children — have died from malnutrition. Over 40 of those deaths occurred in just the past week. The head of the UN agency for Palestinian refugees has reported that aid workers, including doctors, are collapsing from hunger while on duty. For months, UN officials, humanitarian groups, and independent experts have been flagging that Gaza's more than two million residents stand on the brink of famine. This catastrophe is neither natural nor inevitable — it is man-made and entirely preventable. A joint letter signed this week by 109 aid agencies, including Doctors Without Borders, Oxfam and Amnesty, has accused the Israeli government of deliberately obstructing the flow of aid. The only aid points now operating in Gaza are four militarised hubs run by the US- and Israeli-backed Gaza Humanitarian Foundation. These replaced the 400 UN-run sites shut down by Israel over unproven claims that aid is being diverted by Hamas. In the past month, more than 1,000 Palestinians have been killed while trying to access food at these sites due to shelling and firing. Gazans are being forced to make a choice between starving to death and risking being shot in a desperate attempt to feed themselves and their families. This, while Israeli air strikes continue unabated.

Israel's military objective is evidently to defeat Hamas. But the most vulnerable in Israel's war, and on whom it is inflicting the greatest suffering, are the innocent men, women and children of Gaza. Deliberately inflicting starvation on a people does much more than violate international law — Israel is obligated to ensure that aid reaches the population. If it continues its starvation policy with impunity, it will be a severe blow to the rules-based global order, its legitimacy.

International condemnation against Israel is rising, albeit belatedly. Earlier this week, 28 countries, including staunch allies like the UK, Australia, Canada and France, issued a statement that deemed its "denial of essential humanitarian assistance" to be "unacceptable". US Special Envoy to the Middle East Steve Witkoff is in Italy this week, and will perhaps fly to Qatar as well, in a renewed push for a ceasefire. But the world must do more. Notwithstanding geopolitical rivalries over trade or territory, the international community must urgently unite to put pressure on Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to open Gaza's border crossings, and allow aid in.

BRINGING CENTRESTAGE

As artist and storyteller, Ratan Thiyam always came back to Manipur

WHAT IS IT like to be a storyteller in a state torn by conflict? Ratan Thiyam, the doyen of Manipuri theatre who died on July 23 at the age of 76, used to say, "I don't want to be a politician. I am a theatre-person and doing a production is enough for me." He made plays based on myths, wrapping his protest in metaphors of epic proportions. The audiences who crowded the theatres to watch Thiyam's plays had heard the stories of Abhimanyu, Antigone and Ashoka before — and then, they heard them from him.

Chakravayuh, a 1984 play that propelled Thiyam to international acclaim, revolves around Abhimanyu, who is trapped in a labyrinth created by hardened warriors. He dies fighting a war he had not started. Thiyam, skilled in uniting every element of drama, from visual and sound to costumes and lights, put out a spectacular narrative of war. He drew audience attention to a less-discussed aspect of Manipur — how young people, as confident and courageous as Abhimanyu, were caught in a maze of political violence and insurgency. "I have to make plays based on myths, or nobody will take notice of me or my work," Thiyam once said. His plays were searing political commentaries that made audiences in the region, the country and in international forums understand the Manipuri situation as a human tragedy.

In 1987, Thiyam was appointed director of the prestigious National School of Drama in Delhi, his alma mater. A year later, he quit and returned to Imphal to work with his group, Chorus Repertory Theatre, to tell stories. Though he travelled the world with his theatre group, Thiyam always came back to Manipur. His plays were in Manipuri. His aesthetics showcased the culture of the state — traditions such as the Wari Liba, a Manipuri storytelling form, Thang-Ta, a martial arts style, and pung or the Manipuri drum. He kept Manipur in the imagination, his own and that of his audiences.

WHAT YOU REQUIRE is a dictionary, the Supreme Court is reported to have told the SIT in the Ali Khan Mahmudabad case recently. Very soon, the courts may have to say, what you need is a set of Political Science books. The need to read Political Science literature may be necessitated by the mention of Left Wing Extremism (LWE) in a bill passed by the Maharashtra legislature in the name of protecting public security.

Indeed, there is a separate section under the Ministry of Home Affairs that deals with LWE but one is not sure that there is a clear legal definition of LWE. The MHA portal says that LWE refers to organisations that are banned and listed as an appendix to the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act. But that hardly satisfies the test of what conceptually constitutes LWE. Broad innuendos making the rounds in the public domain refer to Maoism. In operational terms, the provisions refer to the use of violence for the overthrow of the state. But since the Maharashtra government now intends to incriminate Left Wing ideology, the onus is on the government to specify what it means by it.

In the absence of clarity, anyone can be accused of subscribing to Left Wing ideology, and then the police will be running from one library to another for material on what constitutes Left Wing ideas. The current dispensation in Maharashtra and nationally is allergic to the idea of the "Left". Therefore, it will do well to come forward and define for legal purposes which ideas are construed as Left and are hence liable to be proscribed.

Maoist violence in many parts of the country has invited a reaction of repulsion even among those who may have a leftward leaning. That repulsion is tactically utilised intellectually and cinematically by some who employ the term "urban Naxal". Even the Maharashtra Chief Minister has repeatedly referred to urban Maoism. What is overlooked is the distinction between those who actively mobilise Maoist violence against the state, those who sympathise with such organisations and those who do not endorse such violence but subscribe to the idea that the stranglehold of capital over state authority needs to be removed.

The other problem with the Maharashtra law is that it incriminates a number of ac-

MEDIA REPORTS OF some of the questions asked and observations made by a Supreme Court (SC) bench comprising Justices Vikram Nath and Sandeep Mehta on July 15 have created a flutter. The bench was hearing a petition by a Noida resident, Reema Shah, against an order by the Allahabad High Court on March 3. She reportedly approached the Court seeking directions to the Noida Authority and others not to harass her, other feeders, as well as any other institution that fed community dogs and animals, both in her society and outside it in Noida. The petitioner, the counsel said, was subjected to harassment and was unable to feed community dogs in line with the Animal Birth Control Rules.

Rule 20 of the Animal Birth Control Rules, 2023 (popularly known as ABC Rules) states, "It shall be [the] responsibility of the Resident Welfare Association or Apartment Owner Association or Local Body's representative of that area to make necessary arrangement for feeding of community animals residing in the premises or that area involving the person residing in that area or premises as the case may be, who feeds those animals or intends to feed those animals and provides care to street animals as a compassionate gesture." It also contains provisions seeking the safety and well-being of human beings in the area in the context of feeding. Several judgments of the SC

The most worrisome provisions in this law pertain to freedom of speech and expression. True, we routinely get a dose of pontification from the judiciary that freedom — and freedom of expression, in particular — is not absolute. It is nobody's case that in the Indian context, this freedom is absolute or without constraints. But the central question that lawmakers and the judiciary must answer is not whether freedom of expression is or should be absolute. The question is whether restraints on freedom of expression can be random and arbitrary.

THE NEIGHBOURHOOD DOG

Animal Birth Control Rules are clear: They can be fed and need sterilisation

and high courts have upheld the validity of the ABC Rules.

Feeding ensures that dogs are healthy and capable of undergoing sterilisation. The ABC Rules also mandate sterilisation, which, as experience in India and abroad shows, is the only way to stabilise the population of street dogs. Moreover, unlike dogs that are fed and vaccinated, hungry dogs are prone to turning violent. Hence, the petitioner in this case was asserting a statutory right as well as performing a constitutional duty.

To prevent conflict, the petitioner sought directions for identifying open, designated areas in Noida where community dogs could be fed without triggering disputes. These are referred to in the ABC Rules as "feeding spots", which are for the RWAs to designate. It was reported that the SC, while hearing her appeal, made certain remarks, including asking, "Why don't you feed them in your own house? Nobody is stopping you." The bench had also stated, "We give you a suggestion to open a shelter in your own house."

Earlier, similar remarks of the Nagpur Bench of the High Court of Bombay were expunged by the SC. On November 16, 2022, a bench of Justices Sanjiv Khanna (subsequently Chief Justice of India) and J K Maheshwari stayed a Bombay High Court order (Nagpur Bench) banning public feeding of street dogs and directed the authorities not to take any coercive step against any-

one by the new law. Therein exists a dual danger. One, any dog-whistling can easily activate the police machinery, and there is no mechanism to first examine such random complaints emanating from ideological or political rivals before action is taken; the Advisory Board comes into the picture only after action is taken by the police. Two, any intellectual activity can easily be brought under the purview of unlawful activity.

What constitutes incitement to violence will always be a ticklish issue legally, morally and politically. For the sake of argument, let us admit that "incitement" may be legitimately criminalised. In that case, incitement against minorities — indulged in even by some members of the state government — should also be criminalised. But since such perpetrators are not Left Wing, this law would turn a blind eye towards that incitement. As the new law says, any acts through words that "constitute danger to peace and tranquility", "acts of generating fear and apprehension in the public", "preaching disobedience of law and its institutions" are construed as unlawful.

A plain reading of these phrases should alert any citizen. Because, while the law mentions LWE, these political acts are the common language of democratic mobilisation and as such practically any social worker can be booked for extending a verbal criticism of authorities and appealing to citizens to protest. Any stringent criticism can be construed as endangering tranquility. Thus, the language of "urban Naxal" is a smokescreen. The tameness and intellectual laziness of the Opposition in Maharashtra is such that it is content with limiting the powers under this law to LWE. In its abject muteness, the Opposition in Maharashtra has shown that it is following in the footsteps of the loyal Opposition in Gujarat.

Following legislation in Chhattisgarh, Odisha etc, this law raises wider issues beyond being Left or non-Left. It is about the idea of the state and protests: Whether the state can be critiqued in a democracy and whether a self-proclaimed democratic state should be criminalising protest, dissent and difference of opinion.

JULY 25, 1985, FORTY YEARS AGO

HISTORIC ACCORD

THE PROBLEM OF Punjab, which has spawned some of the bloodiest events in the country's history in the last four years, has at long last been solved. CBSE's decision to introduce two levels of examinations in Mathematics at the senior secondary level has stirred controversy. Will it come in the way of making students more future-ready?

Two levels of Maths is a bad idea

At a time when mathematical literacy determines economic opportunity, India cannot afford to create artificial barriers to achievement

THE CENTRAL BOARD of Secondary Education's (CBSE) decision to introduce two levels of Mathematics for higher secondary students — basic Maths and Advanced or standard Maths — from 2026-27 represents a misunderstanding of educational equity and excellence. While ostensibly designed to accommodate different student abilities, this bifurcated approach undermines the foundation of comprehensive education and should be reconsidered.

CBSE currently offers Mathematics at two levels in Class X, where both basic and standard levels follow the same syllabus, but the examination for the former is easier. This model, now being extended to higher secondary classes, creates artificial barriers that limit student potential rather than nurture it. The premise that students need "easier" maths fundamentally misunderstands how mathematical competence develops — through challenge, struggle, and eventual mastery, not through diluted content.

The first flaw lies in the psychological impact of labelling. When students choose "basic" Mathematics, they internalise a message about their limitations. This becomes a self-fulfilling prophecy, where reduced expectations lead to reduced achievement. Research consistently shows that high expectations coupled with appropriate support yield better outcomes than lowered standards disguised as accommodation.

As AI and technology permeate every sector — from agriculture to healthcare, finance to creative industries — mathematical literacy has never been more crucial. Today's students will enter a workforce where algorithmic thinking, data interpretation, and quantitative reasoning are fundamental skills, not optional extras. The CBSE's two-tier system creates a generation of artificially segregated students, leaving many unprepared for an increasingly quantitative world.

While India positions itself as a global technology hub, its premier educational board is creating pathways that detracts from mathematical proficiency. The "basic" maths track reduces chances of a career in STEM, data science, economics and numerous other fields. This is particularly problematic given that many students will make these choices at 15-16 years of age, before they fully understand career implications or develop mature mathematical thinking.

The argument that students not pursuing Mathematics beyond Class X need only basic skills is flawed in our current context. Whether analysing insurance policies, understanding loan calculations, evaluating investment options, or simply being an informed citizen capable of interpreting statistical claims, comprehensive mathematical literacy is essential for everyone. Countries leading international Mathe-

matics assessments take notably different approaches. Singapore maintains a unified maths curriculum through secondary education. It teaches students mathematical concepts in a three-step learning process: Concrete, pictorial, and abstract, based on the work of American psychologist Jerome Bruner. Finland maintains a comprehensive Mathematics education without artificial streaming. Its approach focuses on collaborative learning environments where stronger students help weaker ones. The Korean revised school curriculum emphasises contextual learning so that students can grasp basic mathematical concepts and make connections with their everyday lives.

These countries understand that mathematical competence isn't fixed but develops through quality instruction, peer interaction, and persistent effort. Their success suggests that India's approach may be solving the wrong problem.

Building on a system already in place for Mathematics, CBSE will expand its dual-level subject options to Science for Class XI. The existing implementation in classes IX and X provides valuable insights into this policy's shortcomings. Rather than improving mathematical achievement broadly, it has created a two-tier system where students in the "basic" track often struggle when attempting to transition to higher mathematics.

Under new guidelines, students who completed basic Mathematics will now be permitted to take Mathematics in Class XI, but the head

cal competence. This includes investing in teacher training, developing better instructional materials, and creating support systems for struggling students. The goal should be to bring every student up to a high standard.

Mathematical education should prepare students for an uncertain future where quantitative literacy will be essential across professions. Creating artificial barriers through two-tier systems contradicts this imperative. In an era where mathematical literacy determines economic opportunity, India cannot afford to create artificial barriers to achievement. As a postgraduate in Mathematics, it is my conviction that it will be more prudent to abandon this misguided policy and commit to universal mathematical excellence.

THE CENTRAL BOARD of Secondary Education (CBSE) has been entrusted to come up with and apply novel and robust methods to assess and evaluate students. For students in Class XII, evaluation takes the form of board examinations. The classroom experience, no doubt, is a critical part of a young person's academic experience. But so is the examination system. Despite the introduction of CUET in recent years, the board examinations remain a cause for anxiety for a large section of students. In Mathematics especially, the fear of examinations often comes in the way of enjoying the intricacies of the subject.

With a keen eye on students' welfare — as well as the requirements of the knowledge economy — the CBSE has announced the implementation of a two-tier examination system in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) subjects at the senior secondary school level.

At present, a Class XI student may choose to study Standard Mathematics or Applied Mathematics. However, both are flat, dense subjects with scarcely any room for flexibility in the syllabus. In the two-tier system, however, the scenario will be different. A student who chooses to pursue the subject may opt for either basic-level or advanced-level Mathematics. She can take the latter option if she aspires to study Maths at university later, or any other course where Mathematics is expected to play a deep auxiliary role — say, Economics or Engineering. If, however, the student wants to pursue a career in the Humanities, Theatre or Sports, but has an affinity for Mathematics, she can opt for the basic level. The CBSE aims to ensure this choice is available to students no later than the academic year 2026-27. Reportedly, NCERT has already started working on books to meet the intellectual needs of this curriculum.

The idea of offering subjects at two levels is not entirely new. In several Western countries as well as Singapore and Japan, senior secondary students have been exercising these choices for at least a few decades. Since 1975, the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Programme has been the major example of this idea in practice. At the

Diploma level (equivalent to classes XI and XII), students typically study six subjects — three at the standard level and three at a higher level. The higher-level course allows one to dive deeper into the subject. The standard level offers breadth, but not much depth. The final exams are designed to go in tandem with the student's choice. The IB is now relatively established in India, with more than 200 schools having adopted it.

The CBSE's attempt to implement a two-tier curriculum is a much-needed move given the country's diversity and the different learning experiences of students. By reducing the fear of examinations, a two-tiered evaluation is likely to make the subject more amenable to a large number of students. If the purpose of a progressive education system is to draw more young people to a subject, the CBSE's latest move fits this requirement. In addition, STEM subjects are notorious for being intellectually demanding. A Science student in India who passes the Board exam without taking tuition in at least one subject is quite unusual. There is hope that the two-tier curriculum will reduce students' dependence on coaching classes.

The new scheme opens up new possibilities, allowing students to explore some advanced-level subjects in greater depth while still leaving significant scope for them to learn new things in basic-level subjects; those designing the two-tier curriculum should take such possibilities into account.

The CBSE is not making drastic changes in the reading materials. The significant change will be in the degree of difficulty of the examination. This is not to say there will not be challenges. It is not clear how the examination agency is going to evaluate students taking the same subject at different levels. It's also not certain that this move won't create a divide between teachers who handle advanced-level subjects and those who teach at the basic level. Will the student be permitted to change the level of a subject based on her emotional connect with it? Will the student opting for the basic level of a subject feel inferior to another who has opted for the advanced level?

Making a subject more interesting for students is a work in progress and all concerns should be addressed. Even then, a step in the right direction has to be applauded. As Physics Nobel laureate Richard Feynman once said, "I would rather have questions that can't be answered than answers that can't be questioned."

Beyond the brain drain

Countries exporting healthcare workers overlook domestic needs. They also need to intervene to increase bargaining power of doctors and nurses

THE DEMAND AND supply of health workforce across countries continues to be a daunting problem, with most countries lacking adequate numbers of doctors and nurses and a projected global shortfall of 18 million health workers by 2030. Health workers migrate across countries, with the flow typically being from countries in the Global South to those in the North. The countries from which health professionals migrate are also those that face internal supply constraints. Sri Lanka, for instance, witnesses extensive outmigration, which is (partially) addressed by getting professionals from other countries. An estimated 10-12 per cent of foreign-trained doctors and nurses come from countries that are known to have a shortage of local healthcare workers. OECD data estimates suggest that between 2009 and 2019, 25 per cent to 32 per cent of doctors in Australia, Canada, the UK, and the US were medical graduates from South Asia and Africa.

Indian doctors, nurses, and other healthcare professionals migrate to countries across the world — almost 75,000 Indian-trained doctors work in OECD countries, and an estimated 640,000 Indian nurses work abroad. The Philippines is another example — the country is renowned for its large-scale export of nurses and other health professionals. Over 193,000 Philippines-trained nurses work abroad, constituting about 85 per cent of all Filipino nurses worldwide.

Economics and geopolitics influence the extent and nature of such migration through a combination of push and pull factors. Limited career growth and lower wages are key economic push factors. Political instability and conflict in the source country are often political push factors. Trade agreements that encourage migration, health crises that pull health workers to some areas and international recruitment policies are all pull factors, which, in turn, contribute to shortages in source countries. Countries like the Philippines and India have formalised policies to encourage the export of health workers, viewing them as sources of remittances and economic benefit. Yet, both countries have an acute shortage of health professionals.

Despite potential gains in the form of remittances and skill development, the loss of workforce capacity in countries already facing shortages outweighs the gains. What is needed, therefore, is a balanced domestic and international policy response that focuses on the needs of the individual, the national health system and global equity.

Cross-country migration is often leveraged for diplomatic gains. India, already known as the pharmacy of the world, leverages such migration to foster international partnerships, promote economic gains

through remittances and investments, enhance its global influence in health sectors, and manage the challenges of the brain drain through policies encouraging circular migration and bilateral cooperation. It enhanced medical diplomacy during the Covid pandemic by deploying medical professionals to neighbouring and African countries. What is needed now is a greater focus on negotiating more comprehensive — and enforceable — bilateral agreements between source and destination countries, which can potentially include compensation mechanisms, targeted investments in medical education, health infrastructure, or technology transfer, to offset the loss of skilled workers. The WHO code is a starting point in rebuilding such agreements.

Ageing populations alongside declining birth rates are leading to growing demands and acute shortages of healthcare professionals in developed countries. India and other countries hold the potential to supply healthcare professionals. India could maximise gains through improved institutional mechanisms, such as establishing a centralised agency to manage workforce mobility. Kerala's experience with setting up agencies to coordinate overseas employment, address grievances, and support returnees can inform national approaches. So can the experiences of the Philippines' Department of Migrant Workers.

Diplomacy or economic gains cannot override the workforce agenda of individual countries or take priority over the strength of their health system. Countries exporting health workforce could benefit from greater attention to building a cadre of health professionals, developing the health workforce industry and addressing the need for retaining professionals. This will require expanding the health education infrastructure and increasing its economic viability, improving working conditions and providing incentives to retain talent and encourage circular migration, rather than permanent outflow, leveraging digital tools to enable Indian health professionals to provide services globally, where possible, without physical migration, ensuring accountability of international agreements and exploring regional approaches towards enhancing production capacity such as jointly developed and owned mechanisms of workforce production. Amplifying regional voices could potentially increase the bargaining power of workers from developing countries.

By combining investment in workforce capacity, strategic international agreements and policies that maximise economic, knowledge, and social gains, India and other southern countries can transform the migration of healthcare workers from a challenge into a multifaceted opportunity for national development. The rise of agencies in the Global South can mean that countries like the Philippines, Sri Lanka and India are active architects of workforce strategies that balance domestic needs and global engagement. They should be seen as not just exporters of workers or victims of the brain drain.

Islamabad: The Taliban have tortured and threatened Afghans forcibly returned from Iran and Pakistan because of their identity or personal history, a UN report said Thursday. Pakistan and Iran are expelling millions of Afghans who they say are living in their countries illegally. Rights groups and the UN have repeatedly warned that some of those returning are at risk of persecution because of their gender, links to the former Western-backed administration or profession. **AP**

4 major media houses say Gaza staff starving; malnutrition kills 48 in July

"We are desperately concerned for our journalists in Gaza, who are increasingly unable to feed themselves and their families," said a joint statement by The Associated Press, Agence France-Presse, Reuters and the BBC. "For many months, these independent journalists have been the world's eyes and ears on the ground in Gaza. They are now facing the same dire circumstances as those they are covering."

Ahead of E-3 talks, Iran says ready for US talks but only if it rebuilds trust

IRAN IS ready to engage in talks on its nuclear programme with the United States, but only if Washington takes meaningful steps to rebuild trust, Deputy Foreign Minister Kazem Gharibabadi said Thursday.

Iran is set to meet Friday in Istanbul with Britain, France and Germany, known as the E3 nations, and the European Union's deputy foreign policy commissioner. They will be the first talks since Iran's 12-day war with Israel in June, which involved US B-52 bombers striking nuclear-related facilities in Iran. Gharibabadi said in a post Thursday that to enter negotiations, Iran sought "several key principles" to be upheld.

He said these included "rebuilding Iran's trust avoiding the use of talks as a platform for hidden agendas such as military action, though Iran remains fully prepared for any scenario; respecting and recognising Iran's rights under the Non-Proliferation Treaty, including enrichment in line with its legitimate needs; and the lifting of sanctions".

Friday's talks will be held at the deputy ministerial level, with Iran sending Deputy Foreign Minister Majid Takht-e Ravanchi.

48 die in plane crash in Russia's Far East: Officials

ALL 48 passengers and crew onboard a passenger plane that crashed in Russia's Far East have died, the head of the country's Amur region said Thursday.

Russia's Emergency Situations Ministry said earlier that it had found the burning fuselage of the Soviet-designed twin turbo prop plane on a hillside south of its planned destination in the town of Tynda, more than 7,000 km east of Moscow.

The plane, which was operated by the Siberia-based Angara

Israel to allow journalists in and out of Gaza and allow adequate food supplies into the territory.

The statement came a day after more than 100 charity and human rights groups said that Israel's blockade and ongoing

military offensive are pushing Palestinians in the Gaza Strip toward starvation.

Also Thursday, Hamas confirmed it had sent its latest ceasefire proposal to Israel, with an Israeli official calling it "work-

able," although no details were provided. The official spoke on condition of anonymity.

Israel's war in Gaza, launched in response to Hamas' Oct. 7, 2023, attack, has killed more than 59,000 Palestinians, according to Gaza's Health Ministry. Its count doesn't distinguish between militants and civilians, but the ministry says that more than half of the dead are women and children.

Gaza's Health Ministry said 48 Palestinians have died of malnutrition this past month, adding that 59 Palestinians died of malnutrition so far in 2025, up from 50 in 2024, and four in 2023 when Israel started its war against the Hamas militant group in Gaza after its rampage in southern Israel on Oct. 7.

In the most recent cases, a man and a woman died of malnutrition Wednesday, the Shifa Hospital told The Associated Press.

Thailand jet bombs Cambodian targets as border clash escalates

THAI AND Cambodian soldiers clashed in several areas along their border Thursday in a major escalation of their conflict that left at least 11 people dead, mostly civilians. The two sides fired small arms, artillery and rockets, and Thailand also called in airstrikes.

Thai villagers could be seen on video fleeing their homes to seek shelter as the clashes began in the morning. Fighting was ongoing in at least six areas along the border, Thai Defense

Ministry spokesperson Surasant Kongsiri said. The trigger for the clashes was a mine explosion along the border Wednesday that wounded five Thai soldiers and led Bangkok to withdraw its ambassador to Cambodia and expelled Cambodia's.

Thailand has also sealed all land border crossings while urging its citizens to leave Cambodia.

The Southeast Asian neighbours have longstanding border disputes that periodically flare along their 800-kilometer frontier and usually result in brief confrontations that sometimes in-

volves exchanges of gunfire.

The Thai army said its forces heard a drone before seeing six armed Cambodian soldiers moving closer to Thai military positions. It said Thai soldiers tried to shout at them to defuse the situation, but the Cambodian side started to open fire.

Cambodia's Defense Ministry, however, said Thailand deployed a drone first before opening fire, and that Cambodia "acted strictly within the bounds of self-defense, responding to an unprovoked incursion by Thai troops that violated our territorial integrity."

A-G Bondi told Trump his name is in Epstein files, says WSJ report

ATTORNEY GENERAL Pam Bondi is facing Democratic calls to testify before Congress following a newspaper's revelation that she told President Donald Trump that his name appeared in the files of the Jeffrey Epstein sex-trafficking investigation.

The Wall Street Journal reported Wednesday that Bondi told Trump his name was among many high-profile figures mentioned in the files, which the Justice Department this month said it would not be releasing despite a clamor from online sleuths, conspiracy theorists and members of Trump's base.

Trump's personal ties to Epstein are well-established and his name is already known to have been included in records related to the wealthy financier, who killed himself in jail in 2019 as he awaited trial on sex trafficking charges. Sen Adam Schiff, a California Democrat, responded to the report by calling on Bondi and FBI Director Kash Patel to appear before the Senate Judiciary Committee.

"We need to bring Bondi and Patel into the Judiciary Committee to testify about this now," Schiff

EU-CHINA trade ties have hit a "clear inflection point," European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen said Thursday in Beijing, capping a tense summit with top Chinese leaders dominated by concerns on commerce and the Ukraine war.

Expectations were low for the summit in the Chinese capital marking 50 years of diplomatic ties after weeks of escalating tension and wrangling that led to the duration being abruptly halved to a single day at Beijing's request.

"We have very frankly and openly raised our concerns...on the trade, investment and geopolitical issues... We have partially identified solutions," von der Leyen told a press conference after meeting with Chinese President Xi Jinping and Premier Li Qiang. When asked about a potential trade deal with the United States, the EU chief said the bloc's focus has been on achieving a negotiated solution, but all other instruments are on the table until a satisfactory result.

Xi earlier told von der Leyen and European Council President Antonio Costa that the challenges facing Europe do not come from China, urging the bloc to "properly handle differences and frictions."

"It is hoped that the European side will keep the

said in a video posted on X.

The Justice Department declined to comment on the report but issued a joint statement from Bondi and Deputy Attorney General Todd Blanche saying that investigators had reviewed the records and "nothing in the files warranted further investigation or prosecution." Justice Department officials were set to meet Thursday with Ghislaine Maxwell, the imprisoned girlfriend of Jeffrey Epstein, according to a person familiar with the matter.

Over the years, thousands of pages of records have been released through lawsuits, Epstein's criminal dockets, public disclosures and Freedom of Information Act requests.

They include a 2016 deposition in which an accuser recounted she spent several hours with Epstein at Trump's Atlantic City casino but didn't say if she met Trump and did not accuse him of any wrongdoing.

White House spokesman Steven Cheung Wednesday said the reports were "nothing more than a continuation of the fake news stories concocted by the Democrats and the liberal media."

Columbia agrees to pay \$220 mn in deal to restore federal funding

COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY announced Wednesday it has reached a deal with the Trump administration to pay more than \$220 million to the federal government to restore federal research money that was canceled in the name of combating antisemitism on campus.

Under the agreement, the Ivy League school will pay a \$200 million settlement over three years, the university said. It will also pay \$21 million to resolve alleged civil rights violations against Jewish employees that occurred following the October 7, 2023, Hamas attack on Israel, the White House said.

"This agreement marks an important step forward after a period of sustained federal scrutiny and institutional uncertainty," acting University President Claire Shipman said. The school had been threatened with the potential loss of billions of dollars in government support, including more than \$400 million in grants canceled earlier this year. The administration pulled the funding because of what it described as the university's failure to squelch antisemitism on campus.

Columbia has since agreed to a series of demands laid out by the administration, including applying a contentious, federally endorsed definition of antisemitism not only to teaching but to a disciplinary committee that has been investigating students critical of Israel.

Many of the details of his career were showbusiness exaggerations, representative of the blurred lines between fact and fiction in wrestling. His first trainer reportedly broke Hogan's leg to dissuade him from entering the business, but he kept at wrestling, weight training, and — he later admitted — anabolic steroids.

The "Hulk" moniker came from comparisons to the comic-book hero portrayed on TV at the time. "Hogan" was the invention of Vincent J. McMahon, the owner

of the World Wrestling Federation, who wanted Irish representation among his stars.

Hogan became a household name, appearing on the cover of magazine *Sports Illustrated* and performing alongside pop culture stars like Mr T.

Later, he joined competitor World Championship Wrestling, swapping his trademark yellow tights for black and taking on a persona as the villainous "Hollywood" Hogan, the head of a gang of rulebreakers known as the *New World Order*. The gimmick reinvigorated his career. Hogan eventually returned to the WWF, now known as WWE, and faced Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson

at WrestleMania in 2002. Hogan was inducted twice into the WWE Hall of Fame, and referred to himself as the "Babe Ruth" of wrestling — after the New York Yankees' famed baseball player.

But Hogan's support of Trump in 2024 did not go down well with all wrestling fans, and he also faced other controversies. Gossip website Gawker was shuttered after it posted parts of a sex tape between him and a friend's wife and Hogan sued on privacy grounds, winning a \$140 million judgment.

He was married three times and had two children, who starred alongside him and first wife Linda in a 2005-2007 reality TV show, *Hogan Knows Best*. **REUTERS**

INDIA-UK COMPREHENSIVE ECONOMIC AND TRADE AGREEMENT

Scotch imports into India set to get cheaper with tariffs halved to 75%

AFTER THE India-UK Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) signed on Thursday, scotch whisky imports from the UK are set to get cheaper for Indian consumers, with tariffs slashed from 150 per cent to 75 per cent. The landmark agreement does not impose minimum import price (MIP) rules on scotch imports, which had been a key demand of India's domestic industry. British scotch brands including Chivas Regal, Ballantine's, Glenlivet, Glenfiddich, and Johnnie Walker could benefit from the tariff reduction.

Under the agreement, India will immediately cut tariffs by half to 75 per cent, and then to 40 per cent over ten years, once the deal is ratified domestically by the two countries.

Scotch distillers in the UK have welcomed the reduction in tariffs, which will give them greater access to the world's biggest whisky market by volume. Whisky was the UK's fifth-largest export product to India in 2024-25, valued at roughly \$260 million.

"The deal will support long term investment and jobs in our distilleries in Speyside and our bottling plant at Kilmalid and help deliver growth in both Scotland and India over the next decade," Join FREE Whatsapp Channel chat.whatsapp.com/HDvqPnxvwWb3Agy98nVaIQ

said Jean-Etienne Gourgues, chairman and CEO of Chivas Brothers, the firm behind popular whisky brands such as Chivas Regal and Ballantine's.

India's domestic alcoholic beverage industry, however, has flagged potential dumping concerns with the reduction in tariffs.

"Though lowering of import duty on Scotch will help the domestic industry — as Scotch used to produce blended products will also get cheaper — we hope that the government will ensure that Scotch whisky and other spirits (BIO-bottled in origin) are not dumped at low import prices

or routed through any other country at cheaper rates, which would hurt the YOY growth of premium and luxury Indian brands," said Anant S Iyer, director-general of the Confederation of Indian Alcoholic Beverage Companies (CIABC), hours before the full text of the agreement was made public.

To counter dumping, Iyer said the industry had recommended to the government to introduce MIP rules for scotch. However, the agreement does not impose any such requirements on scotch imports.

"With the import duty being

cut drastically, it is high time that a number of state governments end all concessions — such as lower brand registration fees, reduced excise duties, etc. — currently extended to BIO brands," Iyer said.

"This has created a situation where importing Alcobev products is becoming cheaper than producing it in India. With lower import duties, it will now become even more economical for MNCs to import their products. State governments should end all discrimination against India-made alcoholic beverages," he added in a media note.

EXPLAINED Tariffs to be cut to 75% now & to 40% over ten years

INDIA WILL immediately cut tariffs by half to 75%, and then to 40% over ten years. The reduction will benefit British scotch brands including Chivas Regal, Ballantine's, Glenlivet, Glenfiddich, and Johnnie Walker. The deal does not include minimum import price rules for scotch earlier recommended by India's alcoholic beverage industry, which has flagged concerns over potential dumping.

Iyer also flagged lack of market access for Indian-made foreign liquor in the UK and EU due to non-tariff barriers related to maturation and ingredients. "Though Indian whiskies, rum, gins, wines, etc., have been winning accolades globally, the lack of removal of non-tariff barriers and absence of reciprocal market access will make this export target hard to achieve," he said. While tariffs on Indian exports of beverages, spirits, and vinegar have been eliminated entirely, non-tariff barriers are likely to remain.

Import of Britain-made luxury cars to get cheaper

LUXURY CARS made in the United Kingdom will become cheaper in India, with the India-UK Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) introducing tariff-rate quotas (TRQ) for passenger cars and trucks, which will allow automakers to export vehicles at reduced tariffs, limited by quotas. Under the agreement, tariffs on imports of internal combustion engine (ICE) cars will be slashed to 30-50 per cent in the first year of implementation, with the benefit limited to a quota of 20,000 cars. The tariffs will be reduced gradually, and after 15 years, they will become 10 per cent, with the quota set at 15,000 units. For out-of-quota imports of ICE cars, the duties are reduced to 60-95 per cent in the first year, and further to 45-50 per cent from the tenth year onwards.

Currently, India's import tariffs on passenger vehicles range from 66-110 per cent while those on trucks stand at 44 per cent. Industry executives said that import quotas have been implemented to avoid sudden surges in imports and safeguard the Indian auto industry. This reduction,

ranging from 16 per cent to 56 per cent over a period up to 5 years on ICE vehicles up to 2500 cc (diesel)/3000 cc (petrol) and 80 per cent to 100 per cent over a period of 5 years on ICE vehicles more than 2500 cc (diesel)/3000 cc (petrol), is expected to make high-end vehicles more accessible. For electric vehicles (EVs), hybrids, and hydrogen fuel-based cars, tariffs have been eliminated entirely for units priced under ₹40,000 CIF (cost, insurance and freight value). For zero-emission cars priced between ₹40,000 to ₹80,000, tariffs are reduced to 50 per cent and a quota of 400, which from the fifteenth year will become 10 per cent and 2,000 respectively.

For more expensive zero-emission cars (above ₹80,000), duties will start at 40 per cent with a

quota of 4,000 units, which from the fifteenth year will become 10 per cent and 20,000 respectively. The new tariff rates are likely to benefit automakers such as Jaguar Land Rover. It is worth noting that the agreement does not provide for reduced out-of-quota duties on zero-emission vehicles, a decision that will provide some relief to domestic EV and hybrid players. In 2024-25, India's car imports from the UK fell by 46 per cent to \$72 million from \$134 million in 2023-24. For ICE trucks, the tariffs are slashed to 37 per cent for the first year, with a quota of 2,500. From the tenth year onwards, tariffs drop further to 8.8 per cent, with the quota set at 3,500. The agreement does not reduce duties for electric or hydrogen-based trucks.

"The substantial reduction of import duties to 10 per cent in 5 years for UK cars represents one of the most significant outcomes of the FTA and is poised to transform the car market in India, particularly for Completely Built Units (CBUs) due to the drastic duty cut. However, it is crucial that the cars meet the originating criteria of 35 per cent of Qualifying Value Content ('QVC') i.e. the material of UK origin is 35 per cent of total material used," said Saurabh Agarwal, partner and automotive tax leader at EY India.

Trump set to visit Fed as White House ramps up pressure on Powell

US PRESIDENT Donald Trump will visit the Federal Reserve's headquarters in Washington on Thursday as tensions escalate between the administration and the independent overseer of the nation's monetary policy.

The White House announced the visit late on Wednesday. "The Fed is working with the White House to accommodate their visit," a spokesperson for the US central bank said. Trump has repeatedly demanded that Fed Chair Jerome Powell slash US interest rates and has frequently raised the possibility of firing him, though the president has said he does not intend to do so.

On Tuesday, Trump called the Fed chief a "numbskull." The rare presidential visit to the Fed is happening less than a week before the central bank's 19 policymakers gather for a two-day rate-setting meeting. They are widely expected to leave the Fed's

benchmark interest rate in the 4.25-4.50 per cent range where it has been since December, as they wait to see how the economy performs in the face of the administration's tariffs and other economic policies.

The White House did not say if Trump will be meeting with Powell on Thursday, and the Fed referred questions on the matter to the White House. Powell typi-

cally spends the Thursday afternoon before a rate-setting meeting doing back-to-back calls with Fed bank presidents as part of his preparations for the session.

The visit on Thursday also is taking place as Trump battles to deflect attention from a political crisis over his administration's refusal to release files related to convicted sex offender Jeffrey Epstein, reversing a campaign promise.

Earn taxpayer trust: FM to I-T officers

New Delhi: Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on Monday asked income tax officers to raise their benchmark in the timely execution of policies and earn taxpayer trust. Speaking at the 166th Income Tax Day event, Sitharaman strongly advocated for faster issuance of OGEs (Order Giving Effect) and said such delays are unpardonable from the Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT) which could draft the new Income Tax Bill within just 3 months.

OGE — or order giving effect — refers to an order that an I-T officer has to pass when a taxpayer wins a case against the department in an appeal against assessment. "Good policies alone are not enough, what matters actually is timely execution... I think all these years you (tax officer) have done your maximum best. Now is the time to raise the benchmark," she said at the 166th Income Tax Day event here. Sitharaman lauded I-T officers for their timeliness in adapting to newer technologies and drafting the new Income Tax Bill. **PTI**

Enforcement Directorate raids: Anil Ambani's fall & the flicker of a comeback

AFTER THE split between the Ambani brothers, Anil Ambani's journey took a dramatic and difficult turn. Once commanding a glittering business empire, he soon found himself caught in a storm of debt defaults, financial losses and insolvency proceedings. Companies that were once household names — Reliance Communications, Reliance Capital, Reliance Power, and Reliance Infrastructure — began to unravel under the weight of mounting liabilities and regulatory setbacks.

Thursday's Enforcement Directorate raids at numerous locations and on a number of firms linked to the Reliance Group comes as the latest setback to the business house at a time when it was looking to get back on its feet. Over the past two-three years, the Reliance Group looked to start on a revival journey, with a focus on sectors like clean energy, infrastructure, and defence.

By 2017-2018, many of these firms had either entered bankruptcy or faced severe distress. Reliance Communications — which had a market capitalisation of Rs 1.5 lakh crore at its peak in 2007 — ceased mobile operations in 2019 after filing for bankruptcy, burdened by an unmanageable debt of Rs 46,000 crore. Reliance Capital, a leading NBFC of its time, defaulted on over Rs 40,000 crore and eventually lost its insurance and asset management businesses.

In June 2025, the State Bank of India (SBI) labelled Reliance Communications' loan account as "fraudulent," alleging fund diversion that traces back to 2016.

Reliance Naval, acquired by the Reliance Group in 2015, was tasked with building five offshore patrol vessels under a Rs 2,500 crore defence deal. After years of delays and financial setbacks, the Navy cancelled the project in 2020, citing failure to meet deadlines. With over Rs 7,000 crore in debt and no restructuring plan, the company entered bankruptcy in 2020.

As the financial empire crumbled, the group sought to restructure its remaining assets under the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code. Some businesses were wound up, others dissolved or sold off, while a few found breathing room to regroup. Anil Ambani himself quit from the boards of various group companies.

In August 2024, the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) too imposed a five-year ban on Anil Ambani and 24 other entities from participating in the securities market. He was also hit with a Rs 25 crore penalty over an alleged scheme to siphon off funds from Reliance Home Finance Ltd (RHFL) via unsafe general-purpose working capital loans to entities linked to the promoters.

Infra, power revival plans

THE FOURTH edition of the FE Modern BFSI Summit, aptly titled "Finance for a \$5trillion economy" will be held in Mumbai on Friday. The day-long summit will see some of the finest minds from India's financial sector participating in various formats including panel discussions, fireside chats and keynote speeches to share insights, swap ideas and brainstorm on the options to deepen the capital pool needed for India.

The event will begin with a fireside conversation with Reserve Bank of India Governor Sanjay Malhotra. Six months ago, he inherited a challenging economic landscape marked by slowing growth and inflationary pressures. The rest is history — in a short span of time, RBI has unleashed a 100 basis point cut in repo rate, 100 bp cut in CRR, stunning everybody. The keynote address will be delivered by M Nagaraju, Secretary, Department

From 2022 onward, the Anil Ambani group began a cautious, if ambitious, attempt at revival — pivoting towards clean energy, infrastructure, and defence manufacturing. This new strategy placed sustainability and technology at its core, with a renewed focus on solar power and battery energy storage. The group's revival plan is led by power and infrastructure arms. Reliance Power has an operating portfolio of 5,305 MW, which includes 3960 MW Sasan Power Limited (world's largest integrated coal-based power plant). Following Reliance Power's achievement of zero debt, Rosa Power, which operates a 1,200 MW coal-based thermal power plant in UP, is now on track to become debt-free. The company aims to settle its remaining debt in the next quarter, completing the process before the end of the current financial year.

It's now planning to invest over Rs 10,000 crore in a solar power plant and an integrated solar manufacturing facility in Andhra Pradesh. Reliance Power made a profit of Rs 2,947 crore in FY24 and Rs 44.79 crore in the June quarter of FY26. Reliance Infrastructure, once weighed down by debt, reported zero standalone net debt by FY25 and posted a net profit of Rs 216 crore in Q4 of FY25 as against a loss of Rs 3,202 crore in Q3 of FY25. India Ratings recently upgraded Reliance Infra's rating from D to B, pointing to the timely servicing of standalone debt obligations for three consecutive months ended June 30, 2025.

However, it said Reliance Infra continues to face elevated group-level risk due to the financial distress in several subsidiaries. The company now operates through a diversified network of special purpose vehicles (SPVs) across critical growth sectors such as power, roads, metro rail, airports, and defence. Over the past 15 months, Reliance Infra made significant progress in resolving legacy financial obligations arising from corporate guarantees and other liabilities. Reliance Infra and Reliance Power — the two major listed entities — have a market capitalisation of Rs 14,262 crore and Rs 24,690 crore respectively now. At its peak in 2008 before various companies collapsed, the group had a market capitalisation of Rs 3.45 lakh crore.

Reacting to the ED raids, Reliance Infra and Reliance Power said in similarly-worded statements that the ED's actions "have absolutely no impact on the business operations, financial performance, shareholders, employ-

ees, or any other stakeholders", and that the companies have no business or financial linkage to Reliance Communications and Reliance Home Finance, which are purportedly at the centre of the ED's action.

Aerospace & defence: big plans but miles to go

In the aerospace sector, the group had earlier formed Dassault Reliance Aerospace Ltd (DRAL) in 2017, a joint venture with France's Dassault Aviation under the offset obligations of the Rafale fighter jet deal. While DRAL did deliver aerospace structure components — such as cockpit assemblies — for Falcon 2000 business jets, its role remained modest, accounting for only a small part of the total offset value. Plans are now afoot to deepen the partnership.

Dassault and Reliance Group announced last month that DRAL will set up a final assembly line (FAL) for manufacturing the Falcon 2000 jets at Nagpur. The first made-in-India Falcon 2000 is expected to be ready by 2028. This would be the first-ever instance of a foreign aircraft manufacturer setting up an FAL in India for fixed-wing civilian aircraft.

At Miham, Nagpur, DRAL has a manufacturing facility for making various sections of Dassault's best-selling business executive jet — the Falcon 2000. Since delivering its first Falcon 2000 front section in 2019, DRAL has assembled over 100 major sub-sections for the Falcon 2000. Over time, however, Dassault's newer defence partnerships have increasingly leaned toward other Indian players like Tata.

The group recently announced big plans in the ammunition segment also. In June 2025, Reliance Defence formed a strategic partnership with Diehl Defence of Germany to manufacture Vulcano 155 mm precision-guided artillery shells. In May 2025, the group signed an agreement with Rheinmetall AG, another major German defence manufacturer to supply explosives and propellants for medium and large-calibre ammunition.

Despite years of financial turbulence, the group has shown signs of resilience and reinvention. Though much of the original empire lies dismantled, a leaner, more focused Anil Ambani Group is trying to chart a comeback — anchored in energy, infrastructure, and defence, yet still shadowed by its legacy of debt and regulatory scrutiny.

India’s Manchester blues

Visitors endure a chastening day; all out for 354 and then letting England storm away to 225/ 2 at stumps

INDIA COULD blame the weather but that would still sound like an excuse. When England bowled in the morning, there was cloud cover and rain. Late in the afternoon when Indians got the ball in hand there was bright sunlight.

Data also showed that the swing and seam movement dropped drastically as the day progressed. Indian pacers surely didn't get favourable conditions but they didn't help their cause by having their worst day of the tour.

Solid opening partnership

Pedestrian first spells by the entire pace unit helped England to pull away. The 166-run opening-wicket stand between Ben Duckett (94) and Zak Crawley (84) at over 5 runs per over tilted the balance of the game on England's side.

At 225/2, England trail by 153 runs. By the end of the day, India's first innings total of 358 looked insufficient on this track that kept changing its character based on the cloud cover and sunshine.

This clearly was a game of two halves. After the engrossing session-and-half in the afternoon, the evening lacked drama or intrigue. Jasprit Bumrah had an off-day—he was off-target and his pace too was off. Debutant Anshul Kamboj didn't live up to his promise of being accurate and owner of the 'heavy ball' that troubles batsmen. Mohammed Siraj lacked sting. Shardul Thakur was ineffective.

After the pace department had collectively failed and were wicketless in the early part of the England innings, captain Shubman Gill threw the ball to Ravindra Jadeja. On the second ball of India's spinner-in-chief's first over, England opener Crawley stepped down the surface and smashed the ball over long-on for a six.

It was at this point, probably for the first time in the series that India looked deflated. Nothing seems to be working for them. The England opening pair of Crawley and Duckett hadn't looked this solid in the last three Tests like they did at Old Trafford. Forget getting them out, they weren't even beaten in the first couple of hours of their stay. Like was the case when the Indians batted, there was hardly any play and miss.

But for a couple of balls that Bumrah

bowled from round-the-wicket and beat Duckett's bat, it was the case of tight batting against undisciplined bowling.

Stingless Bumrah

Bumrah bowled to a packed off-side field to Crawley. The plan was to invite him to swing his bat freely and try one of his booming drives. It wasn't that the England opener had gone into the shell, it is just that most times the ball was so wide outside off stump that the batsman wasn't tempted. The famous Bumrah consistency was missing and even his pace seemed to have dropped. When attempting to change his line, he would often drift down the leg-side.

Siraj looked tired. There was nothing amiss in his action, his stride had the usual rhythm, the jump too was also in place but the balls lacked the zip.

Like most bowlers with diminishing energy levels, Siraj's effort balls would tail on the leg of the batsmen, making the off-side heavy field redundant.

English commentator Nasser Hussain made a sharp observation about the two England openers Duckett and Crawley.

He said they both had it in them to punish the bad balls but Duckett was more fo-

cused and apt in dealing with the good balls. But at least in this Test, Crawley's shot-selection had improved.

There was a Thakur over where he bowled a couple of great balls—they came in, bounced and seamed away. These balls he left and when the bowler erred in his length he pulled it to square leg for a boundary.

Duckett, like he always does, jumped on loose balls and there were many. If a ball was marginally short on the off-side, he would bring out his tight jab to the cover region. When the ball was short, he didn't go blind to the fielders on the fence, like the Indians. India's two left-handers Sai Sudharsan and Washington Sundar were both out to Stokes' leg-side trap. He would bowl a sharp short ball that climbed towards the head of the batsmen.

Sudharsan and Washington both ended up guiding the ball into the hands of the lone fielder on the fine-leg boundary. India too tested Duckett with the short ball but he had control over his shot, he kept it down and played square of the wicket.

Both Duckett and Crawley missed their centuries. First Crawley edged a Jadeja ball to slips and Duckett was out flashing at a Kamboj short ball outside the off-stump. They certainly weren't top wicket-taking balls but they got the batsmen to commit unforced errors.

As the day ended and players were in the dressing room, two worried men, in India blues, walked up to the pitch. After a brief inspection, coaches Gautam Gambhir and Shitanshu Kotak walked on the turf, talking while staring at the grass blades. India might be feeling the ground under their feet shaking.

Courageous Pant breaches pain barrier, stands tall for his team

AT LUNCH, almost half of the Indian team waited just outside the boundary rope to receive their hobbling teammate Rishabh Pant. Spinner Kuldeep Yadav took his helmet and bat, pacer Akash Deep the gloves, others were checking if he needed help to climb the dressing room stairs. Pant said no, walked gingerly, taking care not to put weight on his fractured right foot.

After ten flights, at the landing, he stopped for a bit. That's when a young fan in the stands, waving a Tricolour, shouted, "We love you, Rishabh." Pant smiled, waved his hand and took ten more discomforting steps on the balcony where coach Gautam Gambhir and the team's most senior player Ravindra Jadeja gave him a hug. These seemed like scenes from a Bollywood sports biopic. Who writes Pant's scripts, Old Trafford wondered.

Before lunch on Day 2, Pant had scored just two runs from seven balls. A day earlier, he had retired hurt on 37 in the final session. On Thursday, he eventually made 54 but fought for his team on one foot. He played 27 balls with a fractured toe. From an overnight 264 for four, India were eventually bowled out for 358.

The dressing room knew the importance of Pant taking the field. If not for him, India wouldn't have reached this score, a challenging one on this difficult track.

Less than 24 hours back, he was carted off the ground in a buggy after getting hit flush on the foot by a slower yorker from Chris Woakes. Scans on the toe showed it was a fracture. A BCCI press statement said Pant wouldn't keep wickets but "would bat as per team requirement". Struggling to reach 300 in the first innings, the team needed him. Through his innings, Pant looked in pain but didn't give up. He never has.

Three years ago, he had met with a horrific car crash on the Delhi-Rourkee highway. When he was rescued from the mangled pile-up, injured beyond recognition, it was feared that he wouldn't survive. Pant too had said that he thought his "time in this world was over". His self-belief and incredibly high pain threshold would give him a "second life", and also a second wind to his career.

On this England Test tour, Pant has been the second highest run-scorer with two hundreds and has proved to be the batsman the rivals dread. Several times in this series, he has unsettled the opposition with his play. The team was aware of Pant's importance.

In a late night meeting Thursday, the BCCI medical team said the wicket-keeper would need six weeks of rest. But could he just bat for this Test with the help of pain-killers, they were asked. "He could, if need be," was the answer. Pant didn't travel to the stadium this

Jagadeesan called up for fifth test

Chennai: With Rishabh Pant ruled out of the fifth Test against England and Ishan Kishan too nursing an injury, selectors have handed a maiden national call-up to Tamil Nadu wicket-keeper N Jagadeesan. The 29-year-old, who has played 52 FC matches scoring 10 tons with a highest score of 321, was informed by the BCCI on Thursday afternoon to join the squad in England, and he now awaits the required visa to join the team at the earliest. Around the time the big batting hope Jadeja was out, a car brought Pant to the ground. When the giant screen showed him in whites, a cheer rose around the stadium. And once he entered the field, the entire Old Trafford was on its feet. There was rhythmic, typically English, clapping as Pant took a while to walk to the central square.

He frustrated the English bowlers by taking them on. They tried to bowl him short balls but that didn't bother Pant. After that, Stokes aimed at his injured leg and bowled a swinging yorker. The ball hit low on the pad, just above the fractured part of the foot. Pant clenched his teeth, shut his eyes and dragged his feet towards square leg. After the brief walk, he came back again to bat.

Pain and Stokes go back a long way. But he wasn't going to get intimidated. Stokes bowled a ball wide of the crease, thinking Pant wouldn't move his feet and struggle to middle it. Pant leaned into it and pushed it -- the ball raced across the boundary line.

On BBC's Test Match Special, they were remembering the 1984 Headingley Test where West Indian great Malcolm Marshall, playing with a double fracture, got seven wickets and batted bravely.

Former India wicketkeeper Deep Dasgupta recalled watching spin legend Anil Kumble bowl with a broken jaw during the 2002 tour of the West Indies. Pant at Old Trafford was joining the greats of the game who didn't allow pain to stop them from doing their bit for the team cause. The myth of the "Courageous Keeper" grows.

END OF A FEUD?

IOA council ratifies CEO appointment in thaw with president Usha

AFTER MONTHS of infighting between the President and executive council of the Indian Olympic Association (IOA), both parties seem to have mended their relationship, at least for the time being.

On Thursday, IOA members confirmed that the appointment of Raghuram Iyer as Chief Executive Officer (CEO) — a bone of contention between the two parties — has been ratified and he will continue in his post.

Till now, the EC members had refused to ratify Iyer's appointment made by IOA President PT Usha in January 2024 - his Rs 20 lakh per month salary along with other perks being the apparent reason for the disagreement.

"Everything is sorted out now and Raghuram Iyer is the CEO of IOA. There are always differences of opinion when there is a discussion but it is all good now," IOA vice-

president Kalyan Chaubey said.

Executive council member Harpal Singh claimed there was no infighting in the IOA, only 'minor bickering'.

"We have resolved all the minor differences and we are united now. While there was infighting, we never let it hamper anything. We continued meeting in smaller groups, we delivered the National Games twice and had a solid performance at the 2022 Asian Games," he said.

The thaw comes after the International Olympic Committee (IOC) raised concerns last month over India's governance issues and the doping menace, asking IOA to get its house in order first as it bids to host the Olympic Games.

Working on governance, doping

The IOA has decided to set up an anti-doping committee, led by executive council member Rohit Rajpal, that will include former shuttler Apama Popat and sports medicine expert PSM Chandran, among others.

"We have made significant progress in the fight against doping but there are problems to be tackled at the grassroots level. The committee will design and implement anti-doping education programmes for athletes

at all levels, coaches, sports officials, and parents," Rajpal said.

The IOA opposed the 'National Sports Governance Bill' for a long time on the grounds that it threatened the autonomy of

sports bodies. However, after multiple rounds of consultations with various stakeholders including IOC and international sports organisations, it was tabled in the Parliament on Wednesday.

"The IOC was concerned about two-three issues but the ministry consulted the world body and other international federations and then the bill was cleared," Usha said.

IOA vice-president and All India Football Federation President Chaubey said, "The Bill is about guiding the sports ecosystem and shouldn't be seen as intervention from the ministry."

Gen Z prodigy versus OG star

Divya, 19, to face 38-year-old Humpy, who outlasts top seed Lei Tingjie in eight games played over three days, in title round

IT'S BEEN A barnstorming campaign in Batumi for the 19-year-old Divya Deshmukh, who became the first player to enter the FIDE Women's World Cup final in the Georgian city on Wednesday after defeating Tan Zhongyi, a former women's world champion. 102 other players started the FIDE Women's World Cup hoping to be in the position Divya finds herself today: a finalist which also ensures she gets a spot at the FIDE Women's Candidates Tournament. The win over China's Tan also ensures Divya seals the first of the three norms needed to become India's only fourth woman to be a grandmaster.

Divya's challenger in the final will be the OG trailblazer Koneru Humpy, who was the first woman from India to become a grandmaster. At 38, Humpy is twice Divya's age. She reached the final after outlasting top seed Lei Tingjie in eight games played over three days, where every time control came into play. After four draws in the Humpy vs Lei game, the Chinese GM won to push Humpy towards the exit door. But the Indian GM then won three games in a row to secure her spot in the final.

The win over Tan Zhongyi was particularly memorable for the teenage girl from Nagpur: after ending the first game with a quick draw, Divya and Tan duelled for over five hours, making just over 100 moves each to emerge triumphant. Tan has been a women's world champion as late as 2018 and just earlier this year was fighting in the women's world chess championship to reclaim the crown. "What's the fun of going into the final the easy way? Wouldn't be me if it wasn't dramatic," Divya wrote on her social media after the win over Tan.

Remarkably, while her opponent was fighting for the greatest title of all in women's chess this year, it was only in June last year that Divya became the world junior champion. It's taken her 13 months to find herself on the cusp of winning one of the most treacherous tournaments in chess. Divya's run to the final can only be compared to the one that Praggnanandhaa made in 2023 at the FIDE World Cup as an 18-year-old, defeating players like Arjun Erigaisi, World No.3 Fabiano Caruana and World No.2 Hikaru Nakamura before losing the final to Magnus Carlsen. Just like Prag's 2023 moment, at the ongoing World Cup, Divya had dispatched Serbian IM Teodora Injac, world No.6 from China Zhu Jiner, veteran Indian grandmaster Dronavalli Harika before beating a former women's world champion.

"This is a huge achievement. The fact that she (Divya) beat players like Zhu Jiner, Tan Zhongyi and Harika is quite impressive. She's someone who has a lot of potential, so I wouldn't say this is unexpected. But people were waiting for this and it's nice that she's delivered," five-time world champion Viswanathan Anand told *The Indian Express*.

"Personally, this represents a breakthrough. Because her results at the FIDE Women's Grand Prix events (which she played recently) weren't at this level. This will be a huge boost to her confidence," added Anand. Divya has attended multiple sessions at Anand's Westbridge Anand Chess

Academy (WACA) to sharpen her game play. As late as 2023, Divya wasn't even certain she wanted to pursue chess full-time. She had told *The Indian Express* in an interaction after winning the title at the Tata Steel Chess India's rapid tournament in Kolkata, that she was 'still exploring' if she wants to continue playing chess full time or focus on further studies. "A lot fascinates me. I'm not sure which field to choose," she had said then. Divya's tryst with chess started almost accidentally.

Accidental chess player

As the teenager had recounted in 2023: "I started playing the sport accidentally. My sister used to go to badminton classes, one day my parents took me as well. But I was just four or five years old then, and I didn't even reach the badminton net. There was a chess class happening in the same building, so my

parents took me there. I liked the sport. Then, I just stuck with chess."

While her elder sister stopped playing badminton a while back, Divya's conquests on the board have brought her closer to becoming the fourth Indian woman to become a grandmaster. Ask grandmaster Abhijit Kunte, who has seen Divya's rise from close quarters, what her best attributes are, and he says: "She has always been very brave, someone never afraid to experiment."

But Kunte points out that she didn't have too much exposure to elite top-level chess before this year, when she played in multiple events of the FIDE Women's Grand Prix.

Anand, meanwhile, praises Divya for her penchant for attacking chess. "She does lean (towards) aggressive (chess). But that seems to be the general trend in women's chess these days," he said.

Kunte, on the other hand, is impressed by Divya's maturity at the age of 19. After the first game with Tan ended in a draw, Divya was almost disappointed with herself, even though she had held one of the strongest players in women's chess to a draw with black pieces. Then after the 101-move rollercoaster in the second game which saw her beat Tan, Divya was again thinking of ways she could have done better: "I could have played much better. I was winning at one point, then I messed up in the middle game. I should have had a much smoother win," Divya admitted in an interview right after the win.

"This kind of maturity at 19 is not easy to get. It's very rare in women's chess," Kunte had said.

One of the happiest moments, title coming to India: Humpy

WITH A march of her king in the penultimate blitz game against China's Lei Tingjie, GM Koneru Humpy barged into the FIDE Women's World Cup Final. In doing so, Humpy set up an India vs India battle for the title, with 19-year-old Divya Deshmukh having confirmed her qualification just yesterday with a win over another Chinese combatant, former women's world champion Tan Zhongyi.

"This is one of the happiest moments for Indian chess fans. The title is coming to India for sure," Humpy told *FIDE* in an interview.

At 38, Humpy is twice Divya's age, which sets up a fascinating clash of generations. Humpy has seen a resurgence in her career over the last year, when she won FIDE World Rapid Championship in December 2024, her second rapid title after the one in 2019. She had eased up on her events over the past few years to focus on her daughter and family life.

The all-India final in Georgia's Batumi also means that there will be two Indians at least in the eight-player Women's Candidates Tournament, which decides the challenger to the women's world champion.

India had its best headcount at the previous Candidates tournament when Humpy and Vaishali had qualified.

Humpy's win was remarkable because it took her eight games over three days to breach the challenge put up by Lei. Humpy and Lei played out two draws on Tuesday and Wednesday in the classical format. The first two tiebreaks, played with 15 minutes (with a 10 second increment per move), also ended as draws before Lei landed the first punch by winning the first game of the 10 minute (+10 second per move increment) tiebreak. Now, Humpy had to win on demand.

Humpy didn't just win the next game; she won three in a row. The first win sent the battle into another best-of-two tiebreak, this time to be played in the blitz format. With both players playing a significant portion of the game under severe time pressure, Humpy managed to defeat the Chinese GM in 70 moves. Now, Lei had to win on demand with white pieces, but she lost instead in 33 moves.

"It was a very tough match, initially I played very badly with black pieces. She always had the advantage. After the loss, it was a very difficult situation but I was able to come back. The blitz portion was in my control. I played a bit shaky in the rapid portion," Humpy said.

Hooda signals the start of something special

METICULOUS PV Sindhu-centric tactical preparation, defensive solidity and some clean, gutsy stroke-play saw 17-year-old Unnati Hooda land the first blow on her legendary senior on Thursday. The 21-16, 19-21, 21-13 win came in front of a gleaming Changzhou crowd, watching the earth shift slightly in Indian badminton at China Open.

The gleeful shuttler, whose defence was impressive on the day, had been ready for fearless battle, and was under no pressure. She said: "I stayed patient and when the side changed I was ready to play long rallies and a long match from the start of the third game. I didn't expect I would win today but I came thinking I'll give my all whatever the match result will be. Winning against her is surprising for me too. I was happy to win against her. It was a good match."

The Haryana teenager, trained by her father and a bunch of sparring mates at Rohtak, has been considered a special talent since she was 14. There was always a stubbornness and abrasion to her game, where she feared no reputation, knew she had the strokes, power and pace to trouble big names, and never lacked self-belief. But it would need more than self-assured poise to get past Sindhu, even while she struggles to go deep into tournaments and is severely impeded in her speed, if not power.

Hooda had come prepared. She had been preparing for months, in fact, after being blasted by a big rattling Sindhu game at Syed Modi last winter in Lucknow. They were ranked No 35 and No 15 respectively. She knew the big smash would always loom from Sindhu and she needed to absorb that pressure, but she had plans to deny any elevation to belt down her hits and keep her busy, head

dragged down in retrieval, on the front court.

This she did by severely testing Sindhu's lunge. Her height gives her the expansive attack, and even the reach to get to the front court. But the low lunge has always tested Sindhu, and Hooda kept peppering the forehand spots with pinpoint drops - some from imbalanced positions.

Undaunted, unintimidated

Hooda set the tone early, and never allowed Sindhu to snatch the lead in the opening set. A clean striker with the racquet, Hooda also has some pretty nifty footwork and anticipation. Her game pace might get tested, starting with Akane Yamaguchi on Friday in the quarters, but against Sindhu, her game-plan was watertight.

She didn't get intimidated by Sindhu's reach, knowing that even if she retrieved 20 shots, she could fox her on the 21st. So she eschewed errors on the lines, took the un-

certainty of minimal court drift, precision mistakes out of the equation. With a good 45-day training block, Hooda's fitness was optimum, and she came prepared for long rallies even as she claimed the opener 21-16, with a clean break from 13-13.

Undaunted, her personality always has been, and those around the Indian team talk of her self-assurance when she was unfazed by Sindhu's reputation even when she made the Uber Cup squad at 14. There's no need as such, but Hooda did hurry her serves (or simply, serve the soonest) and twice found Sindhu not quite ready to receive. Having broken the age-old rule of no coaches when two Indians play, the duo also got on with setting down a clear rivalry, where they would use every help available to beat the other.

Sindhu trailed 11-14, levelled at 15-15 and went on to push a decider, but it was at 13-13 in the second that Hooda made her point. After the rushing serve, the immediate point

thereafter was one of the longest, blisteringly paced rallies played by Indians on the circuit in many years, and Hooda drew the best out of Sindhu even, like Nozomi Okuhara used to. Hooda used a variety of drops and tosses, at a fast clip, to harry Sindhu and leave her panting.

More nuanced was the body attack. Sindhu's body defence, owing to her frame, has always been tentative, but Hooda didn't quite smash into her torso; she simply looped the shuttle at awkward lengths, forcing Sindhu to thwack it out of the court in an untidy parry. In the decider she opened up the court cerebrally. Her ability to play set-up points leading up to a winner or drawing out an error is rather impressive. She could lull Sindhu into thinking she had a chance, could push her to corners, trigger really awkward positions from which she struggled to recover for the next return. And then she brought out her own smash.

Shoulder-heavy smash

It's not a power bazooka, but it's more than strictly workable. She puts a lot of shoulder on it, and two down-the-lines stunned Sindhu a little, as Hooda opened up a 15-10 lead. Continuously chasing, with Hooda calmly inscrutable in front of her, Sindhu couldn't quite take control of any rallies, besides going for the smashes. Hooda's own scramble defence is not too shabby. And she simply threw herself at the shuttle, and even if she didn't retrieve half a dozen smashes, she bought herself time and breath with subsequent mopping of the court.

It was pretty evident when Sindhu went for the lines and sent one wide, trying to keep the shuttle away from Hooda that she wasn't entirely comfortable. Two errors from overhitting brought Hooda to the threshold. And the win was sealed with an expansive cross-court smash — that ought to make Sindhu very proud of her.

Another step forward in the Satwik-Chirag rebuild

THE CHINA Open Super 1000 Round of 16 win mirrored Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty's career as a pairing - a swell start, needing to dig deep and learning to stay calm and battle discomfiting zones along the way.

Playing Leo Rolly Carnando and Bagas Maulana, a juggled Indonesian pairing, Satwik-Chirag were dragged into what is now a familiar flat game, demanding a set of strokes that

they have literally had to learn anew by unlearning their natural repository of aggressive down strokes. It's a tilted axis - not many leaping smashes north to south, just a lot of angular whizzings east to west and diagonal. Crouch, chisel a clever curler, crunch a point.

Rinse, repeat. 21-19, 21-19 in 43 minutes for the day, recorded. Having repeatedly been caught off guard on the literal receiving end of funky spinning, shooting, squirming serves over the last 18 months, the Indians showed glimpses of coming to grips with a weapon the Indonesians and Malaysians have been liberally using against them.

This they have been doing by tweaking their crouching stance, keeping their heads and bidding their time while puncturing the fear around the serve. They stub it with some aggression now and use racquet angles to shake off the fanged poison. But just like their career, the steep inclines invariably follow the smooth sailings. Except now they aren't caught unaware having faced many calamitous situa-

tions in the past year. So even after they had broken away at 16-all to take the opener 21-19, things got ticklingly unfunny in the second. Chirag told the BWF, "It was quite topsy turvy, back and forth, we didn't really have a sizeable lead, neither did they. At some point we were leading by 2 points. They led by 2. Eventually at 16, we finally had that breakthrough when we got 3-4 points in a row. And we could close out that first game. But we should have started that second a little more calmly. We could have restricted them quite a bit. But they played good badminton as well.

Service and receiving. But happy we could finally get that game," he added.

The flat, fast game simply needs constant improvisations and endless patience, while never foregoing aggression. But every jazzed up serve dished out needs to be dealt with. And like Satwik says, it needed digging deep. And committing this debugging to muscle memory.

"After first game, we got a lot of confidence. Like Chirag said, we were a little passive, not so aggressive on receiving. Way too many mistakes that we didn't make in first game. Then they got their rhythm. Then we again had to dig deep and here and there, had to struggle."

While the Malaysians Ong-Teo offer them no respite there is incremental, hard-earned progress.

Chopra-Nadeem face-off in Poland next month unlikely

Karachi: The much-anticipated duel between double Olympic medallist Neeraj Chopra and reigning champion Arshad Nadeem at the Diamond League in Poland lies in uncertainty after the Pakistani javelin thrower underwent a surgery on his calf muscle in England recently. Chopra and Nadeem were scheduled to face each other for the first time after the Paris Olympics in the Diamond League in Silesia, Poland on August 16 and then in Switzerland next month. Nadeem's coach Salman Butt, who is with him in England, informed that the reigning Olympic champion is unsure for both the events as he was more focussed on making his comeback at the World Athletics Championships in Tokyo in September.

Anahat in Jr. Worlds semis, medal assured

New Delhi: After coming close thrice in the past, India's teenage squash prodigy Anahat Singh finally ended her quest for winning a medal at the prestigious World Junior Championships as she beat Egypt's Mallika Elkaraksy in the quarterfinals in New Cairo on Thursday. The 11-6 13-11 11-5 win took Anahat into the semifinals, which assures her a place on the podium. After a bye in the opening round, Anahat defeated Joelle Kim of Canada 11-4, 11-4, 11-2 in the round of 64. In the next round, she overcame Ines Guyot of France even more comfortably, 11-1 11-6 11-1. The quarterfinals saw the Indian beat Brazil's Laura Da Silva 11-5 11-2 11-6. In her first Egyptian test on Thursday against Elkaraksy, Anahat was finally pushed, especially in the second game, but she prevailed 13-11 to ensure her run of not dropping a game continued on.

BFI elections to be held by August end

New Delhi: Boxing in India is currently being managed by a six-member panel headed by Ajay Singh, who said that the elections for the national body would be conducted by the end of August. "The BFI elections will be held on August 27 or 28 tentatively," he told the media. "We did start the process of conducting the elections in March. But it was held up due to various litigations. The world body, World Boxing, subsequently created an interim panel. We have been asked to conduct elections before August 31." Earlier the Indian Olympic Association had formed a three-person committee to investigate why the elections were being delayed. Ajay Singh's term had ended in February. But Singh had said that the interim committee was on track to conduct the elections according to the timeline agreed upon with World Boxing.
